## Dedication

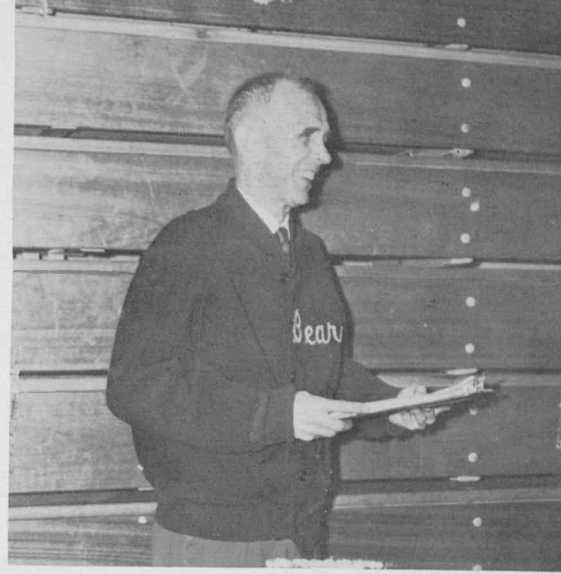

**HISTORY** — The history of Colorado State College closely parallels much of the growth and development of the Greeley Union Colony. The Colony was organized in 1879 by Nathan C. Meeker, traveler and newspaper correspondent, and was named after Horace Greeley.

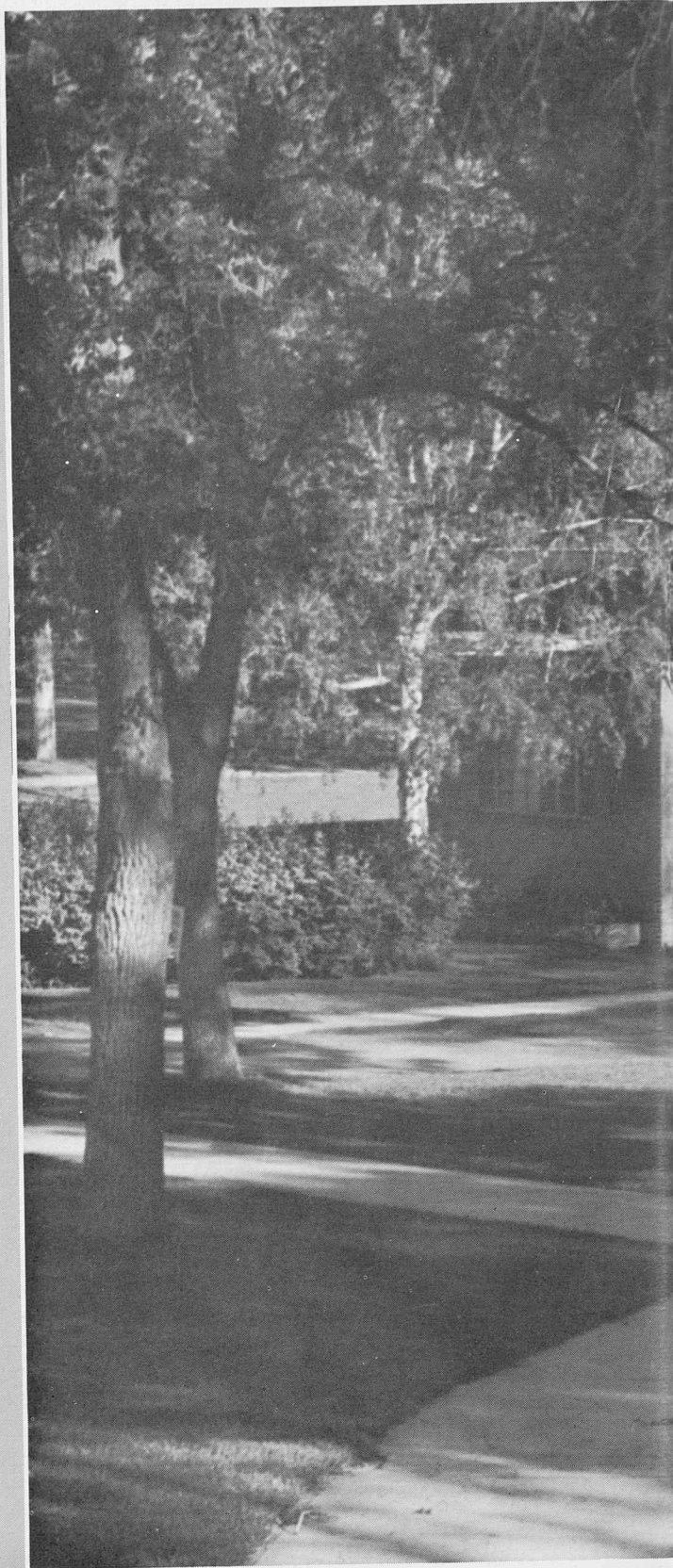
When the Colony was eighteen years old, a movement was started to establish a normal school to supply teachers for the community and state. The law creating the State Normal School was signed on April 1, 1889, and the cornerstone of the first building was laid on June 13, 1890. Classes were started October 6, 1890, with a staff of the principal, four instructors, and ninety-six students. Certificates were granted upon the completion of the two-year course.

In 1911 the name was changed to Colorado State Teachers College by the state legislature. The college was then offering four years of undergraduate work and granting the Bachelor of Arts degree. In 1935 the name of Colorado State College of Education was adopted to recognize the fully developed graduate program which was started in 1913. Early in 1957 the state legislature approved shortening the name to Colorado State College, effective October, 1957.

**CAMPUS** — Colorado State College has two main sections, the city campus and the mountain campus. The city campus, in a beautiful residential area of Greeley, has three parts — the main campus, the East campus and a new West campus.

The mountain campus, acquired late in 1956, includes 80 acres of land nearly adjacent to Estes Park village amid some of the most spectacular scenery in the Rockies. The mountain campus is being developed as a site for educational conferences and meetings as a base for field trips.

The physical plant of the city campus includes thirty-three buildings exclusive of college-owned fraternity and sorority houses. Two blocks east of the main, or original campus, is the East campus, site of the men's residence halls, baseball and football facilities of Jackson Field, and a portion of college housing for students. The main campus is the site of all academic buildings, the student union, and the women's residence halls. Land for the new West campus was acquired in 1956 and the college is now building on this 148-acre site.

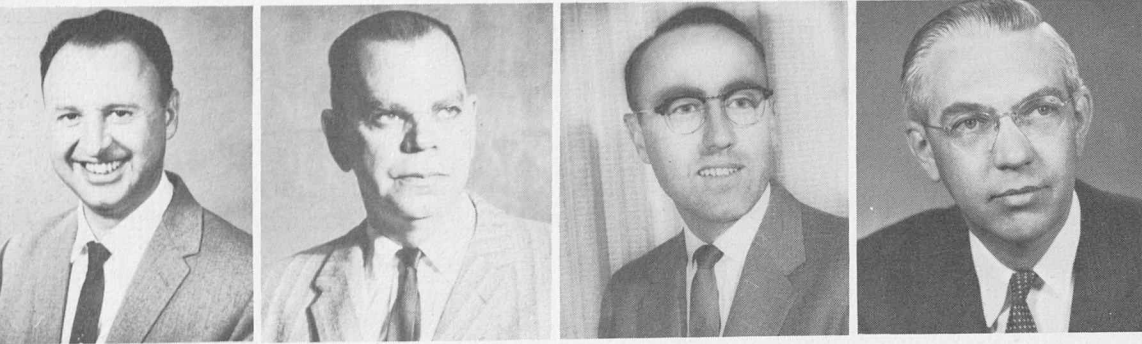

The primary purpose of Colorado State College is to prepare teachers for many kinds of educational positions. The administration and faculty expect each student to maintain a high standard of scholarship and professional development, and to be thoroughly prepared at the time of his graduation. Four programs are offered—an undergraduate program and three graduate programs.

Colorado State College is accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools as an institution conferring the Bachelor of Arts, the Master of Arts, the Specialist in Education and the Doctor of Education degrees. The college is accredited by the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education for the preparation of elementary teachers, secondary teachers, and school service personnel, with the Doctor's degree as the highest degree approved. The college is a member of the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education, the American Council on Education, and the Midwest Conference on Graduate Study and Research.



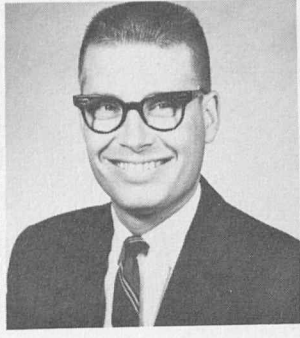

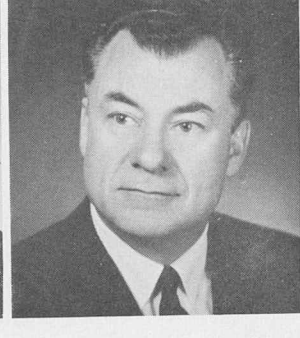

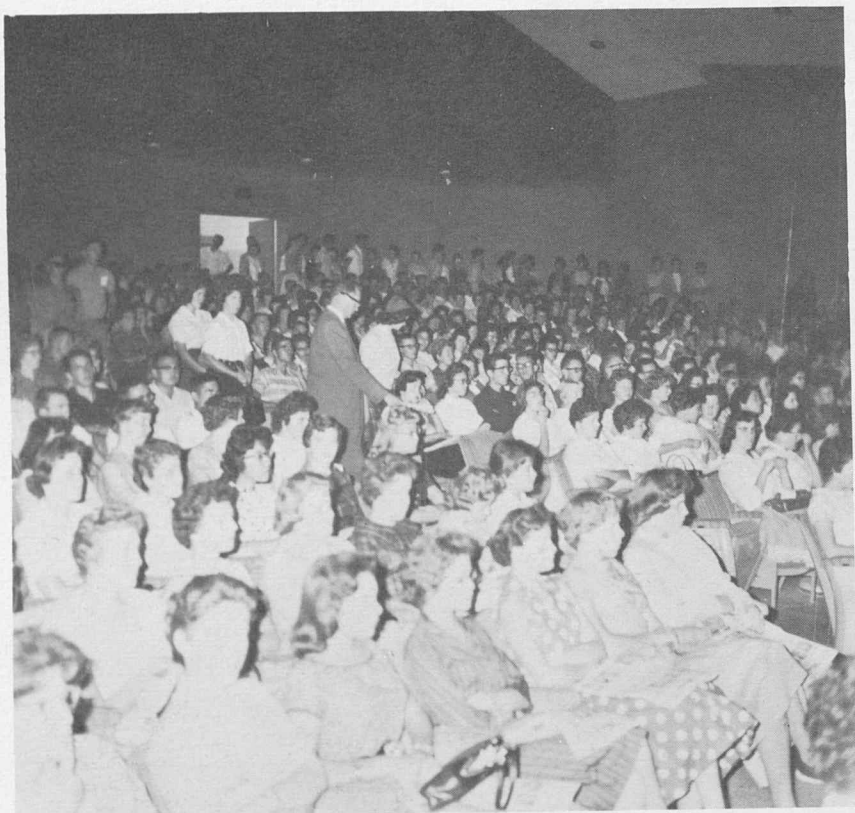

Air Force ROTC was first established in 1946 in leading colleges and universities as a part of the Army's ROTC program. Formal control of its own ROTC program was assumed by the Air Force at college level on July 1, 1949, and introduced at Colorado State College in the Fall quarter of 1951. The Air Force ROTC program is the primary source of junior officers for the Air Force today.

The Air Force ROTC program of instruction is integrated with the regular college academic degree requirements to permit the student to receive undergraduate credit for all Air Science courses. Upon successful completion of the Air Force ROTC program and attainment of a degree, the student upon the recommendation of the Professor of Air Science may be offered

a reserve commission as Second Lieutenant in the United States Air Force Reserve. If called to duty as a reserve officer, the student has an opportunity to apply for a regular commission in the United States Air Force. Physically qualified commissioned Air Force ROTC graduates are eligible to apply for pilot or aircraft observer training in the grade of Second Lieutenant.

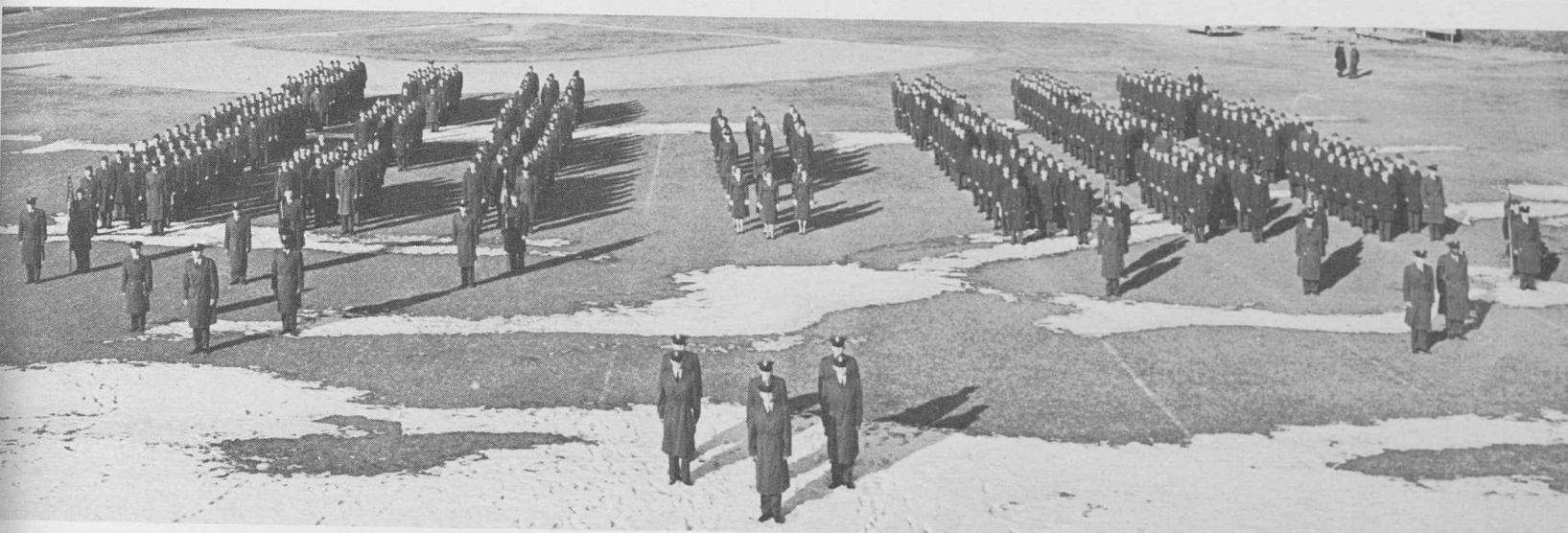
The mission of the Air Force ROTC is to develop in selected college students, through a permanent program of instruction at designated civilian institutions, those qualities of leadership and other attributes essential to their progressive advancement to positions of increased responsibilities as commissioned officers in the United States Air Force.

The Division of Education includes the fields of Business, Business Education, Curriculum, Educational Administration, Educational Psychology and Guidance, Elementary Education, Elementary School Administration and Supervision, Higher Education, Junior High School Education, Junior High School Administration and Supervision, Library Science, Preschool Education, Secondary Education, Special Education and Outdoor Education.

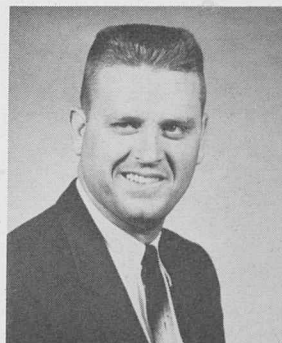
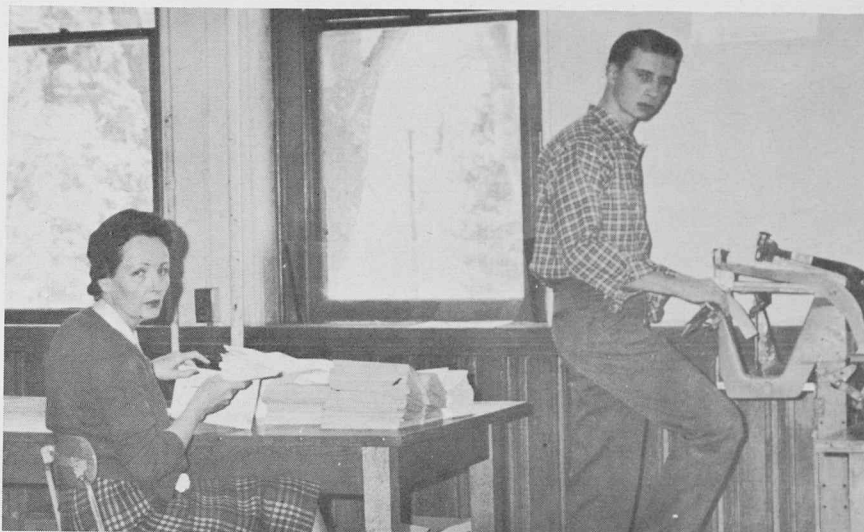
Persons pursuing a degree in elementary education have the chance to become well grounded in the fundamentals of the elementary school program. They have an opportunity to take individual courses in such areas as the teaching of reading, arithmetic, social studies, language, science, art, music, and physical education.

An emphasis on outdoor education affords students the opportunity to become better acquainted with the potential the out-of-doors has as a laboratory for teaching. Course offerings which have significance for this broad area are offered in every division of the college.

The Special Education program affords students the opportunity to qualify for a Colorado Special Education Certificate with emphasis on teaching the physically handicapped, the mentally retarded, the hard of hearing, the deaf, the blind and/or the partially sighted. Students may also qualify for a Speech Correctionist certificate.

The campus Special Education school, a cooperative project of the Greeley Public Schools and Colorado State College, provides a laboratory in which students may observe and do student teaching. At the present time, this laboratory school enrolls mentally retarded, physically handicapped, hard of hearing, and deaf children. An enlarged Special Education facility will be built soon at Colorado State College and will enroll all types of exceptional children.

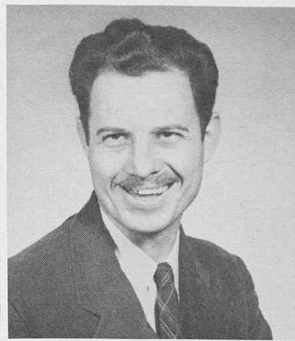
The Little Theatre of the Rockies presents several outstanding plays during the year. Students may try out for parts in the plays or work as stage crew members.

The Division of Music is housed on three floors of the newest building on the campus—Frasier Hall. It occupies the entire north wing made up of rehearsal rooms, classrooms, studio-offices for the faculty, and forty practice rooms available to individual music students.

There are twenty-one full-time members of the music faculty, all of whom are eminent in one or more fields of music specialization. Some are outstanding conductors, others excellent performers in either vocal or instrumental music, and all are outstanding teachers. Private instruction in all aspects of vocal and instrumental music is available with members of the faculty.

The music program at Colorado State College is directed toward developing the teacher-musician. The bachelor of arts degree carries with it a teaching certificate. Consequently, a liberal program in music education along with the usual music subjects makes up the general content of the student's program.

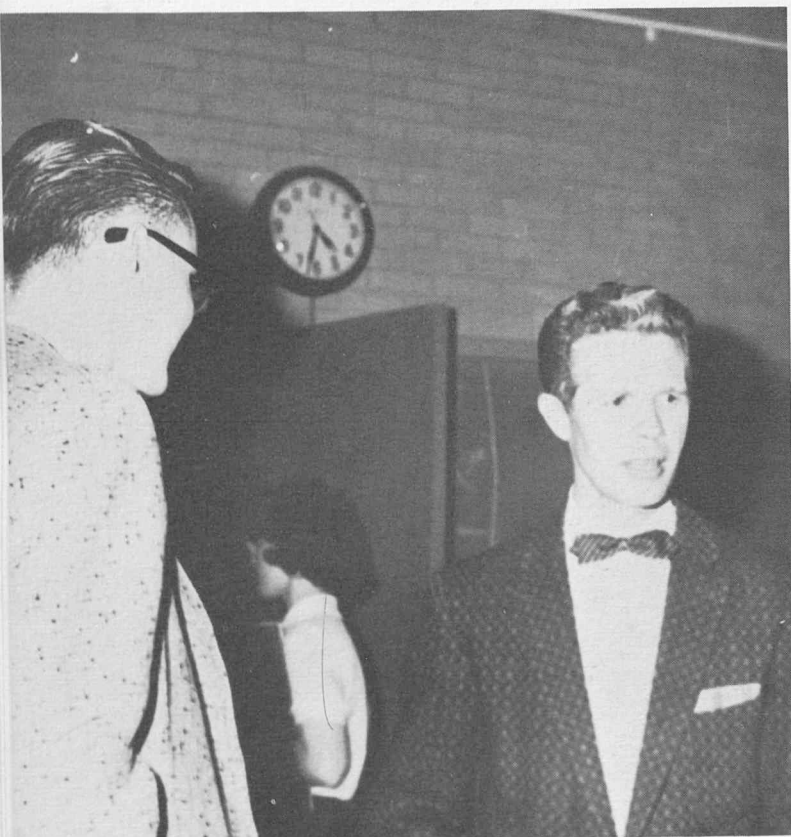

The Division has an outstanding international relations club which sponsors the Model United Nations Assembly each spring.



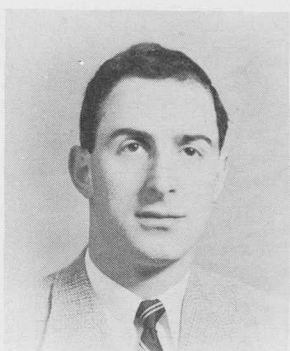

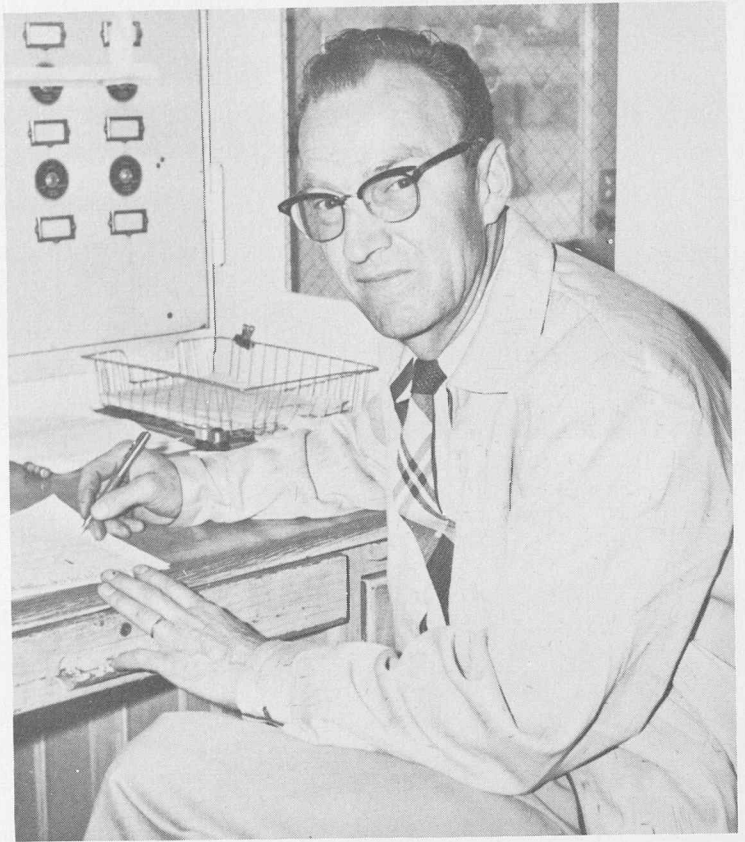
## Laboratory School

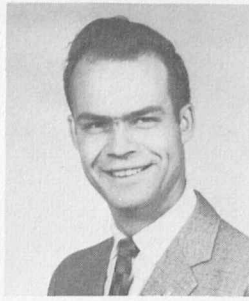

# Association Of Childhood Education

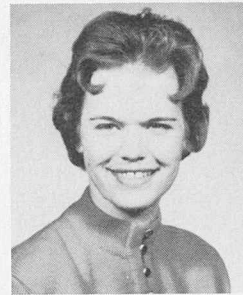

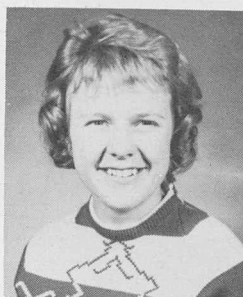

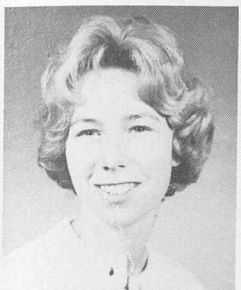

## Bjorn Ski Club

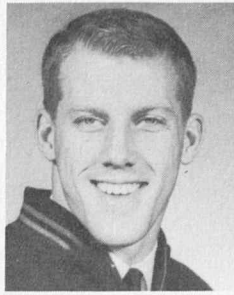

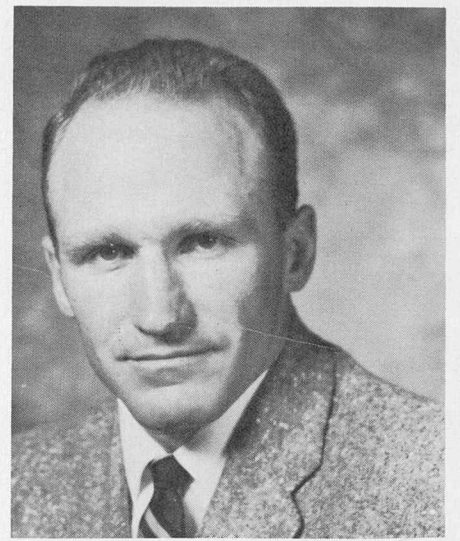

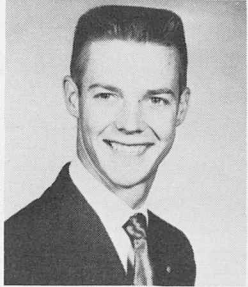

This hard-working organization spends many hours in rehearsal in order to bring outstanding music to our campus throughout the year.

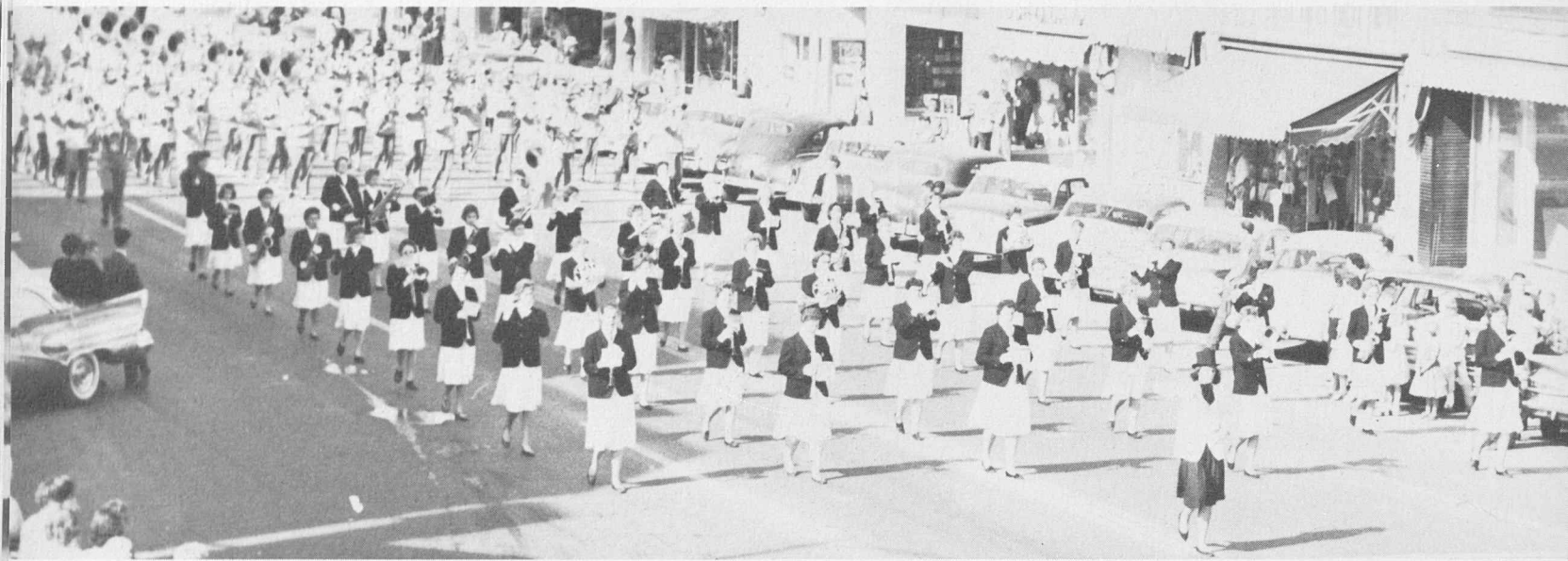

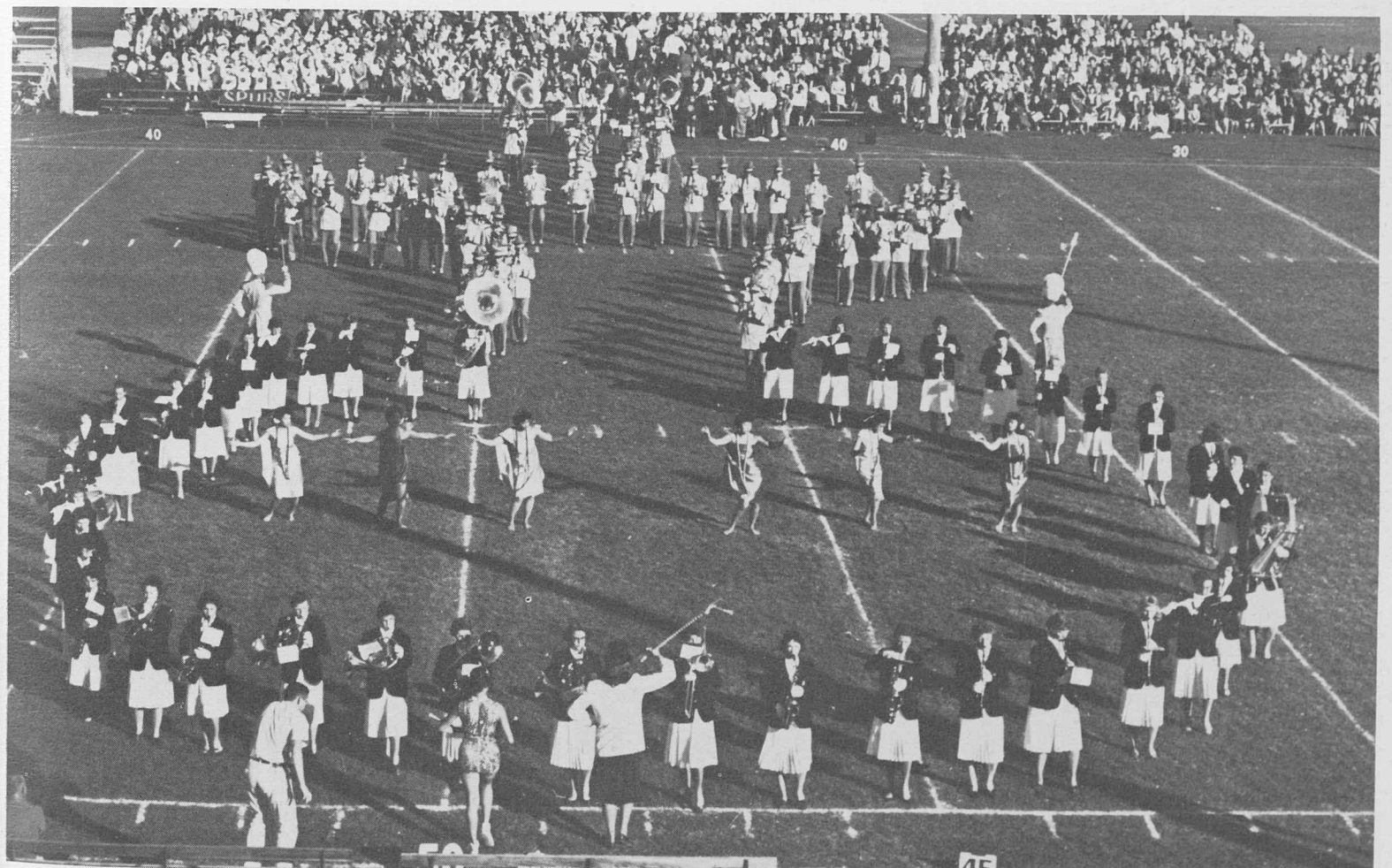


## Marching Band

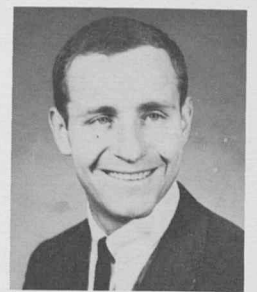
# Bowling Club

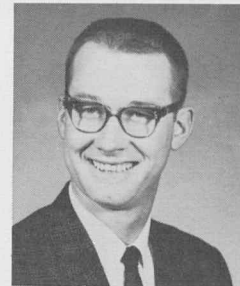

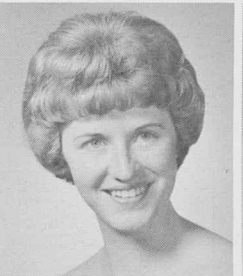
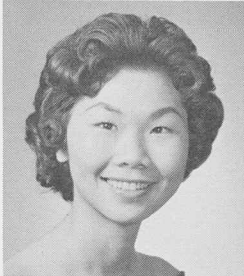
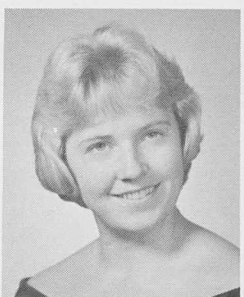
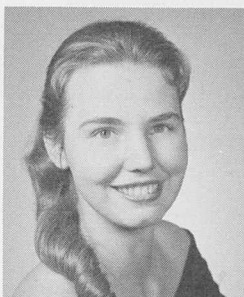
# Alpha Phi

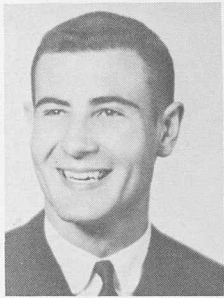
# Sigma Chi

They discover their place in the world as adolescents and decide to live as such.

LOOK HOMEWARD, ANGEL, a comedy-drama of gigantic proportions, was adopted from Thomas Wolfe's novel into a stage play by Ketti Frings. It was presented on Broadway in 1958 and became the little Theatre's selection for its winter play.

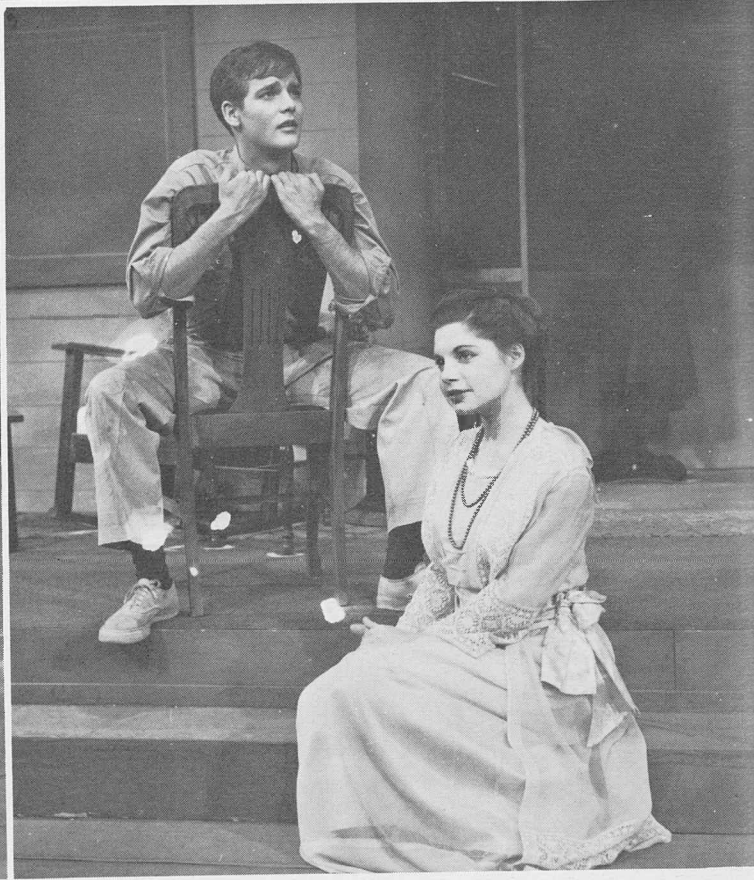
The play covers a few weeks during the first world war in Wolfe's home town in North Carolina. In this time Eugene Gant (Wolfe) finds his way into the

world outside his money-greedy mother's domain via the betrayal of his love by an older woman. His mother, Eliza, intends to keep her sons and her husband, W. O. with her until she dies—the wealthiest woman in town. But all three escape finally—W. O. in drink; Ben, Eugene's older brother and his idol, by dying a prolonged death; and Eugene by his hunger for life spurred on by the betrayal of his love.

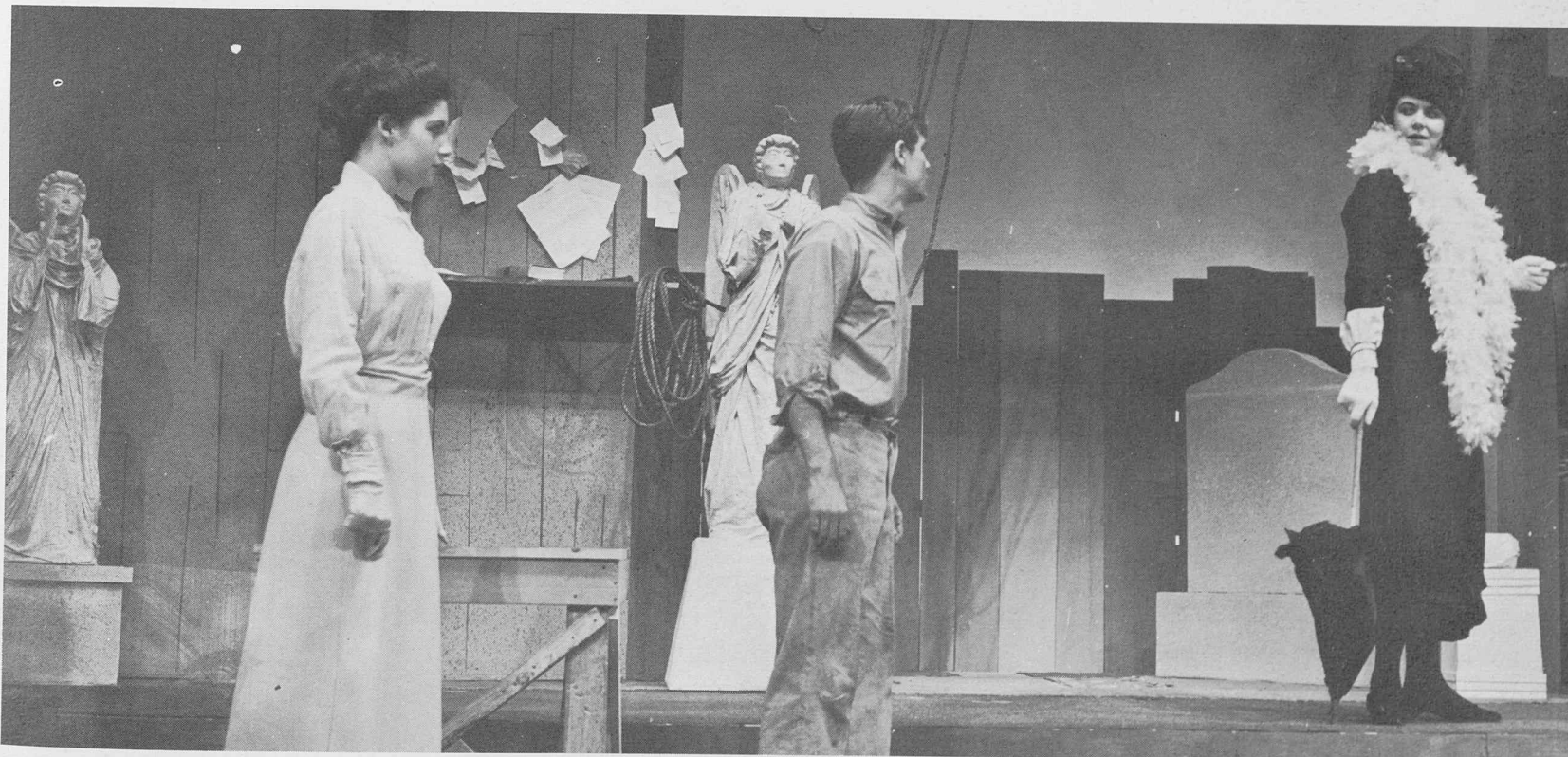

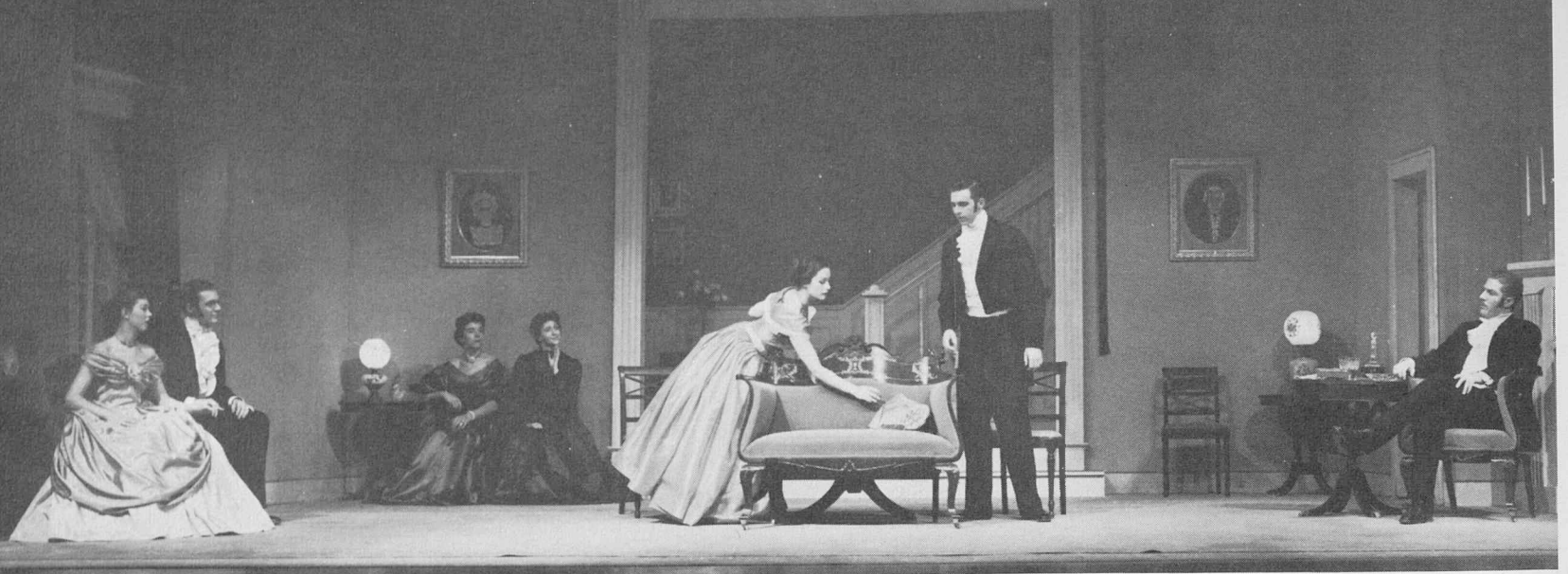

# Little Theatre Of The Rockies

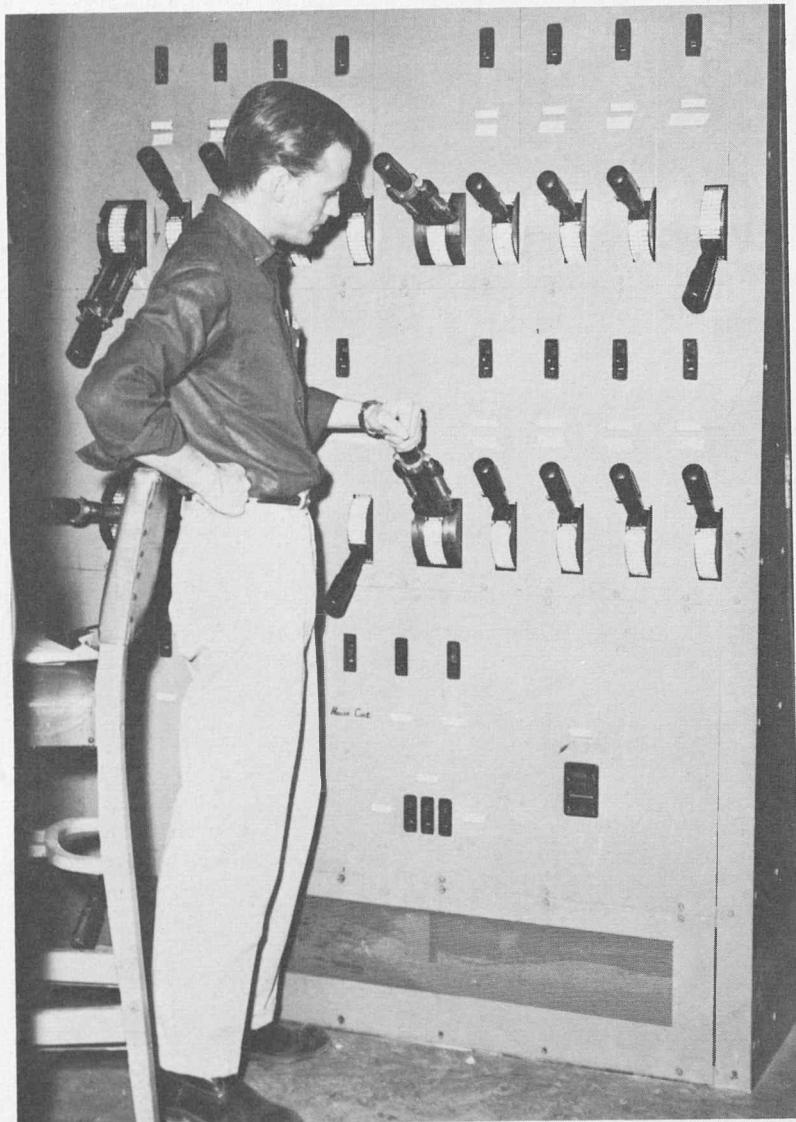

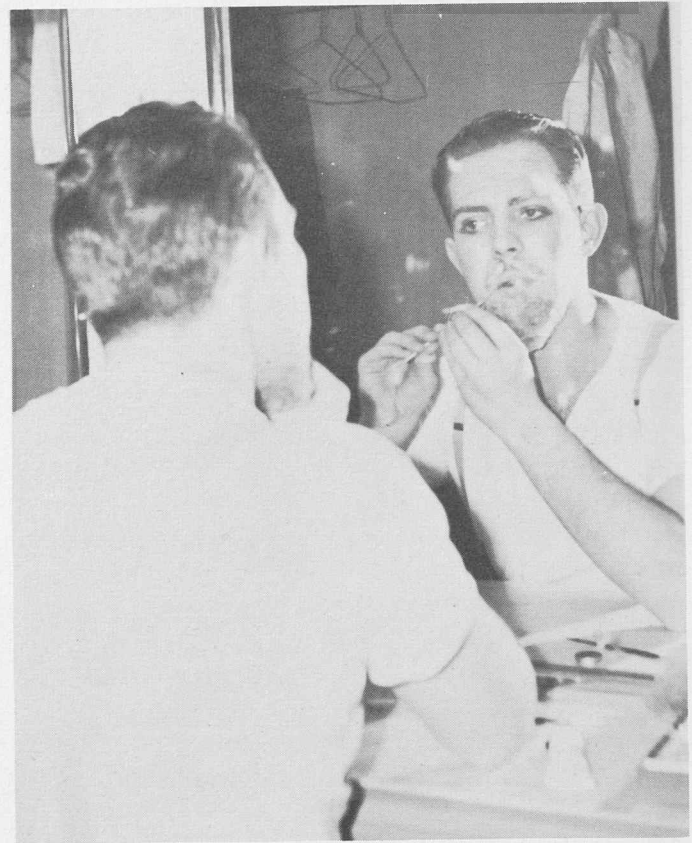

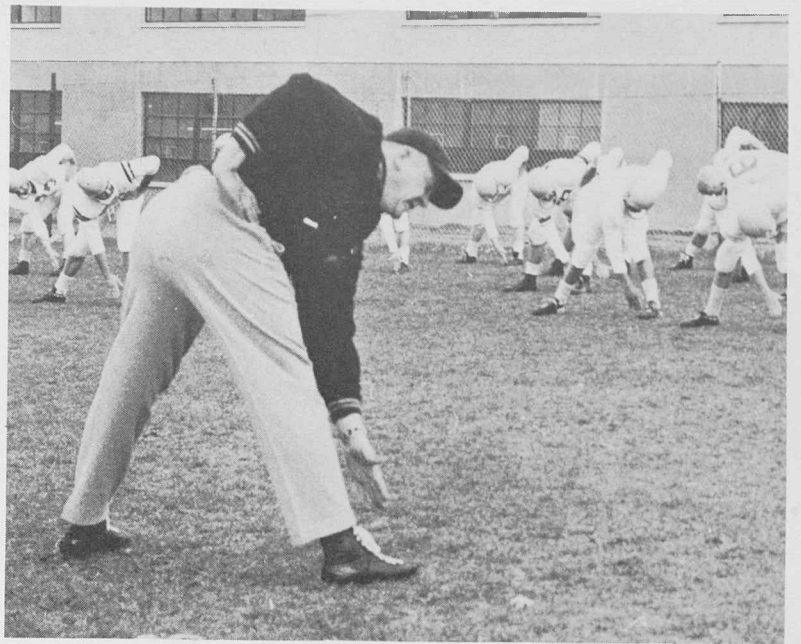
Don Herrick's greatest achievements were his display of sportsmanship, courage, and perseverance; both academically and athletically.

Born in Elmira, New York on August 29, 1938, and later moving to Phoenix, Arizona, Don compiled a 13-0 record as a Phoenix Junior College standout. Transferring to Colorado State College in his junior year, Don was rated 3rd team All American and pitched Colorado State College into the College World Series. Having the characteristic of a great pitcher in becoming stronger as a game progressed, and exhibiting fine control, Don would usually finish out the entire game. After compiling a 10-2 record and a 1.85 earn run average in "1959", Don was plagued by a sore arm and victimized by ptomaine poisoning which made his pitching in the series questionable. With the greatest will and ambition to play, Don overcame the illness and pitched a 3-2 victory over Utah to even the RMC race.

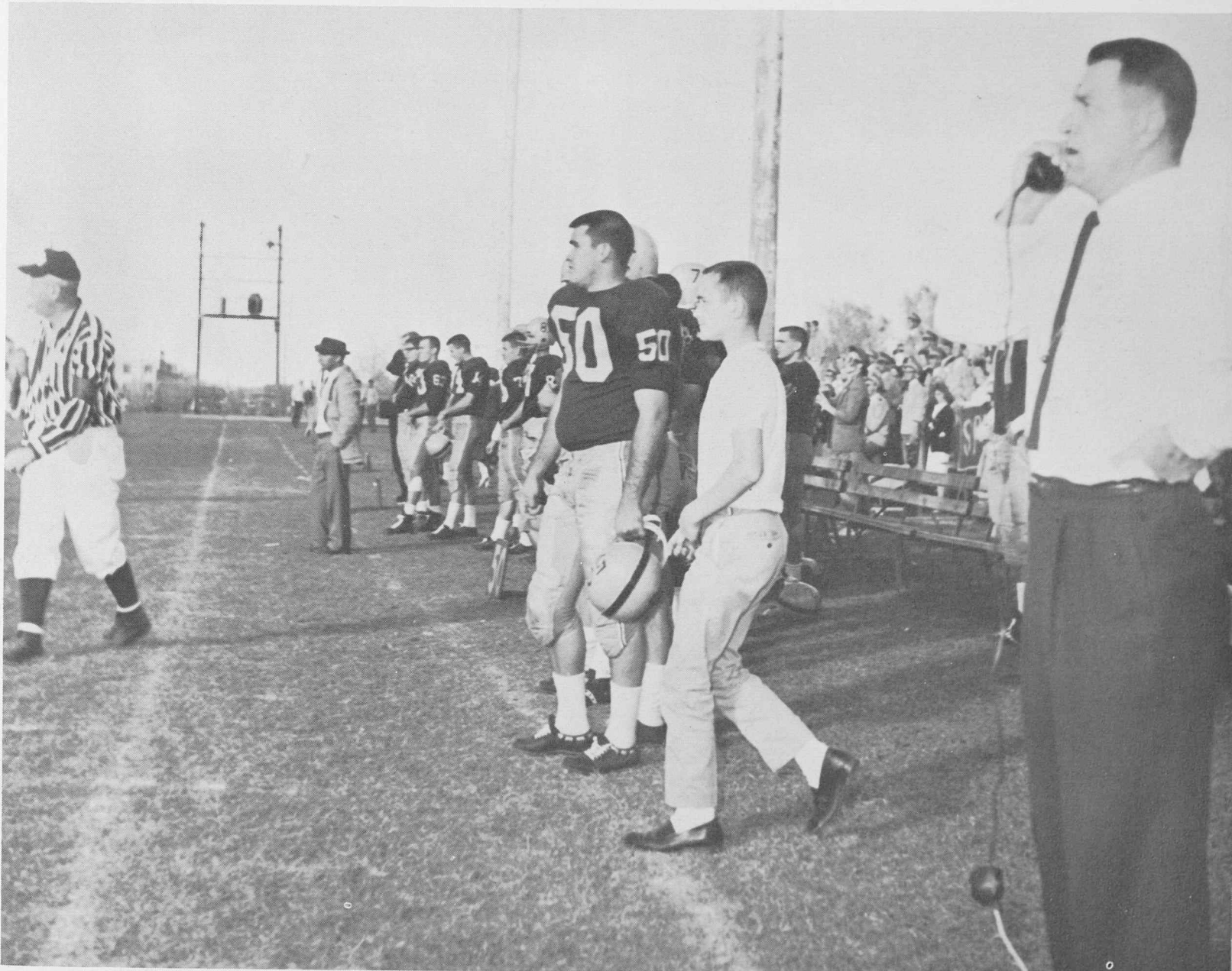
The greatest feat of Don Herrick's career was his pitching in the 1960 College World Series and containing St. John's of New York to 3 runs in a gruelling 13 inning battle which equalled a record for the number of innings pitched. The 3-2 loss to St. John's was a heart-breaker for the team and Don Herrick. After the series Don continued to be as friendly, courteous and humorous as before, even though heartbroken and tired.

The death of Don Herrick on August 3, 1960, was a great loss to the student body of Colorado State and even greater to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Donald S. Herrick. Although Don Herrick must now pitch for someone greater, his memory and ideals will be the building blocks for future great and humble athletes as himself.

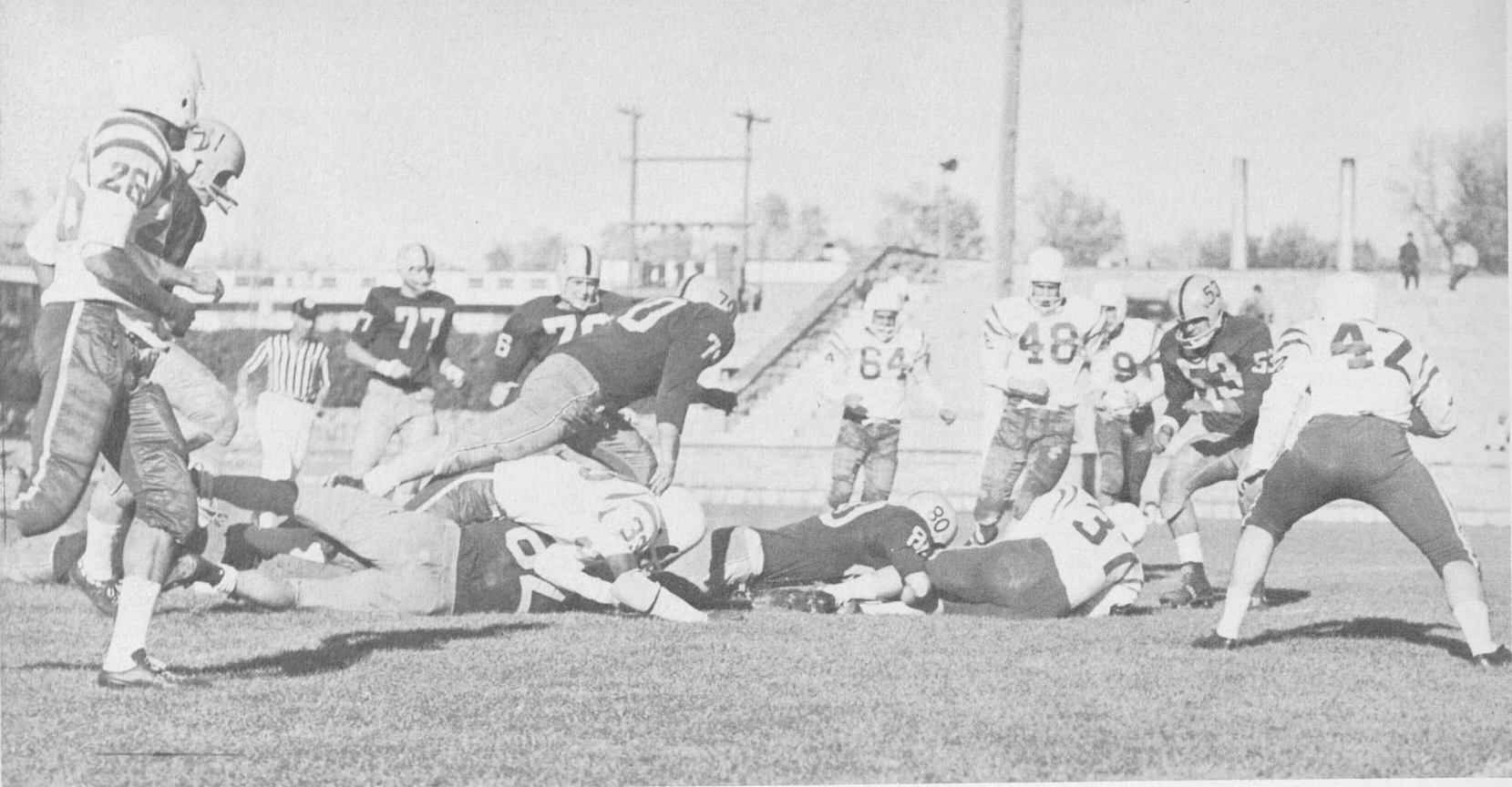
Under *Coach Lindahl*, forty candidates arrived at Jackson Field for 1960 Fall conditioning and game drills. With three returning veteran linemen *Wayne Lee*, *Del Woelfle*, and *Rich Rangel* and shifting *Butch Gardner* from halfback to quarterback, and putting depth at right half, *Coach Lindahl* started the BEARS for their bid at the Rocky Mountain Conference championship. The BEARS started the season in fine fashion by downing South Dakota and fighting a tough Western State to a 0-0 tie in opening games. By the end of the season, the BEARS had compiled a 2-2-1 conference record and placed *Butch Gardner* and *Wayne Lee* on the Rocky Mountain Conference team and led the conference in total rushing yardage by compiling 2,216 yards to the closest opponent's 1,904 yards.

## Homecoming Game

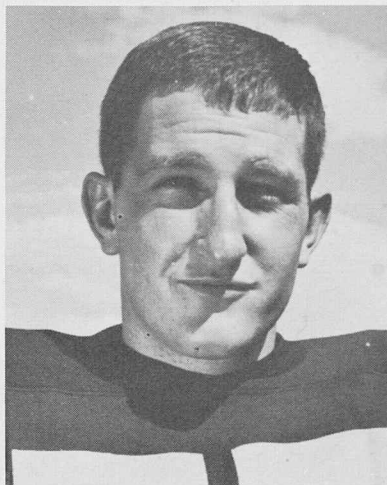

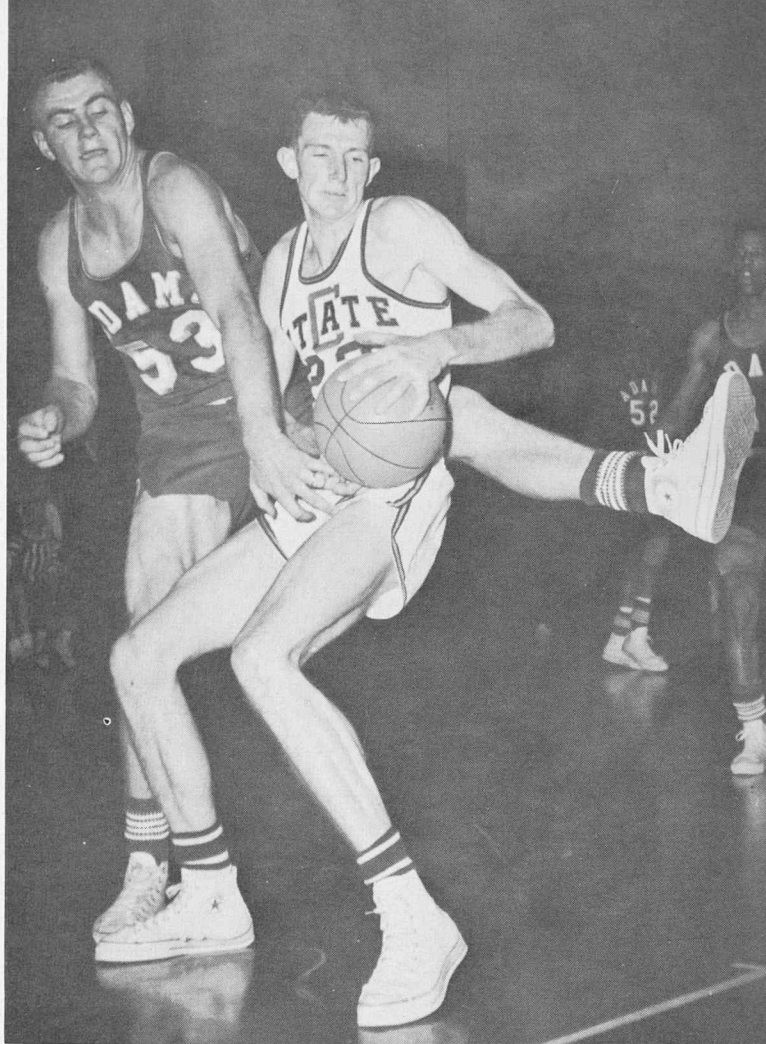
# Bears Place Third In Conference

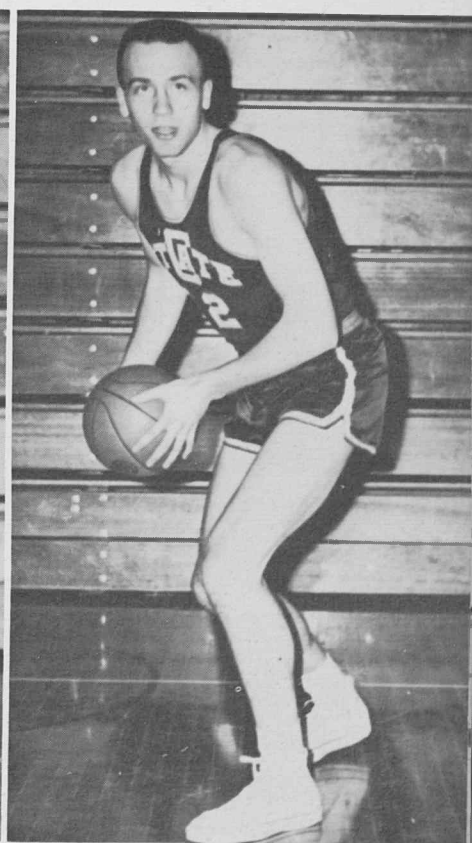
Returning home from non-league contests on the west coast, the BEARS squared off against talented Colorado College. Defeated by Colorado College in the first game of a twin bill 83-57, the BEARS came back to defeat the tigers at their own game 86-75. With a conference victory, the BEARS faced the Indians of Adams State the following week and split a twin bill with the Indians which gave the BEARS a 2-2 Rocky Mountain Conference record. In an exciting overtime game against Western State, the BEARS defeated the Mountaineers 74-68 and hit the three digit figures in an impressive 100-75 second game victory. A heated game against the Idaho State Bengals left the BEARS disappointed as the Bengals won 75-65. The remaining four games, the BEARS split with Adams State and won two from Colorado Mines and advanced to play against Colorado College for the Rocky Mountain Conference championship. The BEARS needing two victories to gain the crown, were tossed for heavy losses as the Tigers defeated the BEARS 105-78 and 99-85. ## BEARS GAIN 19TH ROCKY MOUNTAIN CONFERENCE BASEBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

Under the direction of coach *Pete Butler*, the hard hitting, fast fielding, and courageous BEARS gained their 19th Rocky Mountain Conference baseball championship and ended the season with an overall 23-9 win-loss average and a 15-1 conference record.

During the crucial playoff game against Utah State, the BEARS were sparked by *Don Herrick* with his morning victory of 3-2 and *Frank Carbajal*, with *Cisco Carlos* in relief, in the afternoon game of 6-2. The BEARS' win against Utah State made them eligible for their 9th College World Series. Under crucial examination, coach *Pete Butler* picked 17 men out of the regular 26-man squad to participate in the series. Upon entering the series the BEARS were ranked 20th in the United States.

Starting against Boston College in the series was *Frank Carbajal* who pitched until the 7th inning when he was relieved by *Cisco Carlos*. The BEARS fought Boston with all they had, but without a rally they lost 8-3. The following day the BEARS played their double elimination game against St. John's of New York. *Don Herrick* went all the way for the BEARS and equalled a series record for the most innings pitched which was 13. Through unflinching pitching, *Don Herrick* kept St. John intact for 7 straight innings, but lost out in the 13th inning as the BEARS lost 3-2.

Out of 32 season games the highest batter was *John Koehler* with a .462 average. *John* was second highest batter in the Rocky Mountain Conference, and topped the league with 43 runs scored, 55 hits, and 40 runs batted in. *Gerald Maglia* topped the Rocky Mountain Conference with 53 strike outs, and *Frank Carbajal* topped the team with a 6-0 pitching record.



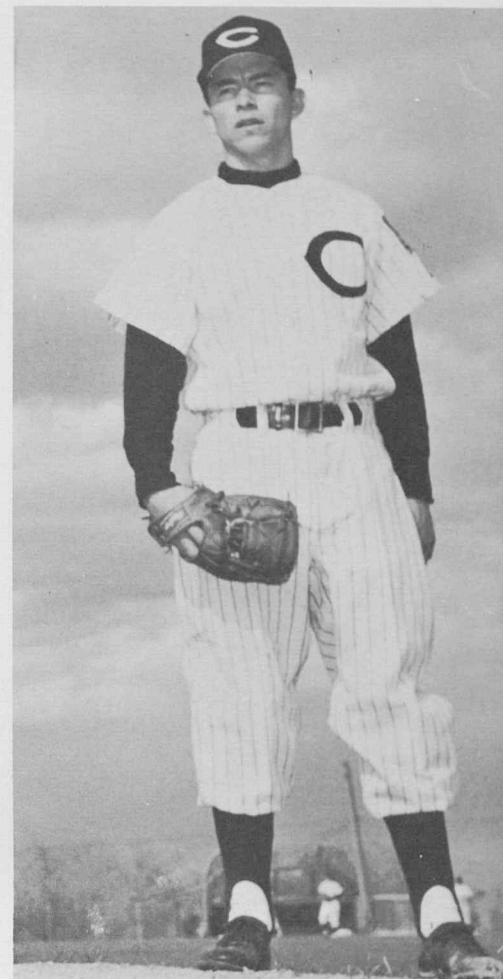

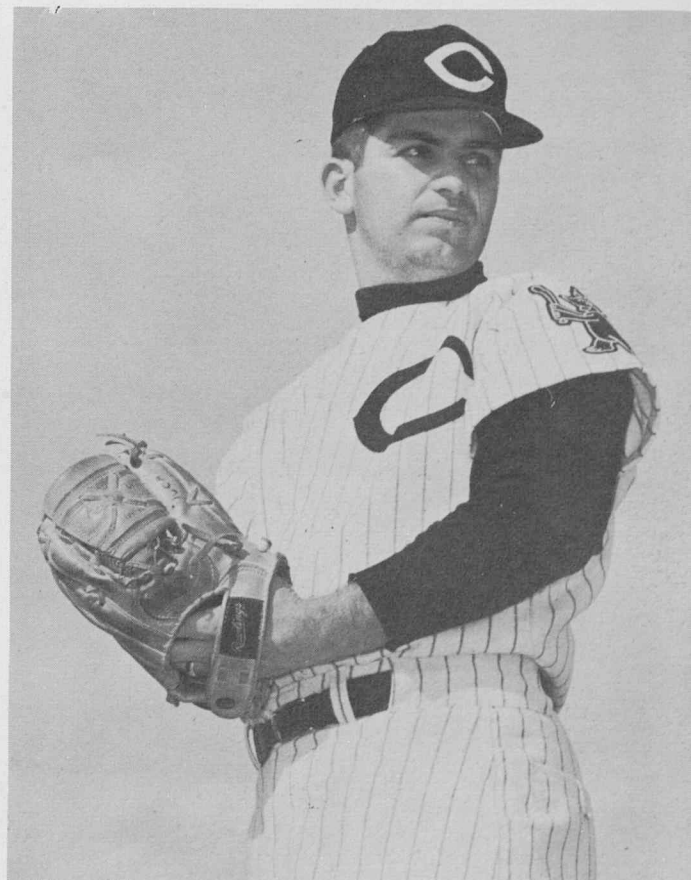

With six experienced members returning to the ranks, the BEARS thirty-eight man track and field team was out to dethrone the defending AAU champions, Idaho State. At particular points in the season *Bob Ring* threw the shot 51 feet 11 inches and bettered the school's record and placed second in AAU competition. *Paul Wachholz* threw the discus for 149 feet 2½ inches and bettered the school's record and took conference championship. *Ken Spooner* ran away with the Rocky Mountain and AAU championship in the high hurdles in 14.7 seconds.

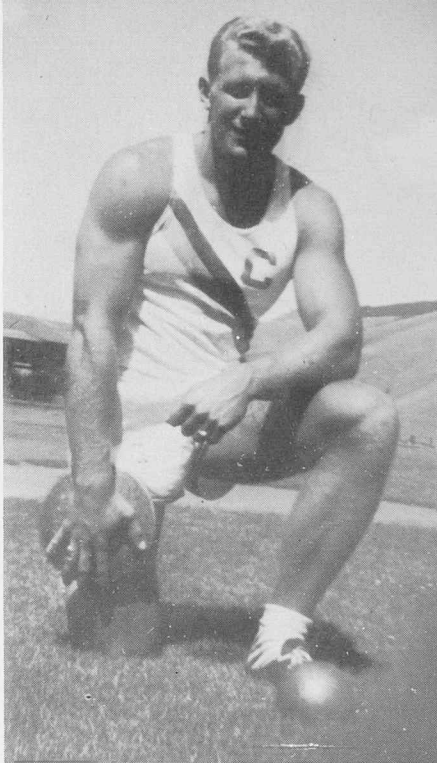

# Racketmen Take Conference



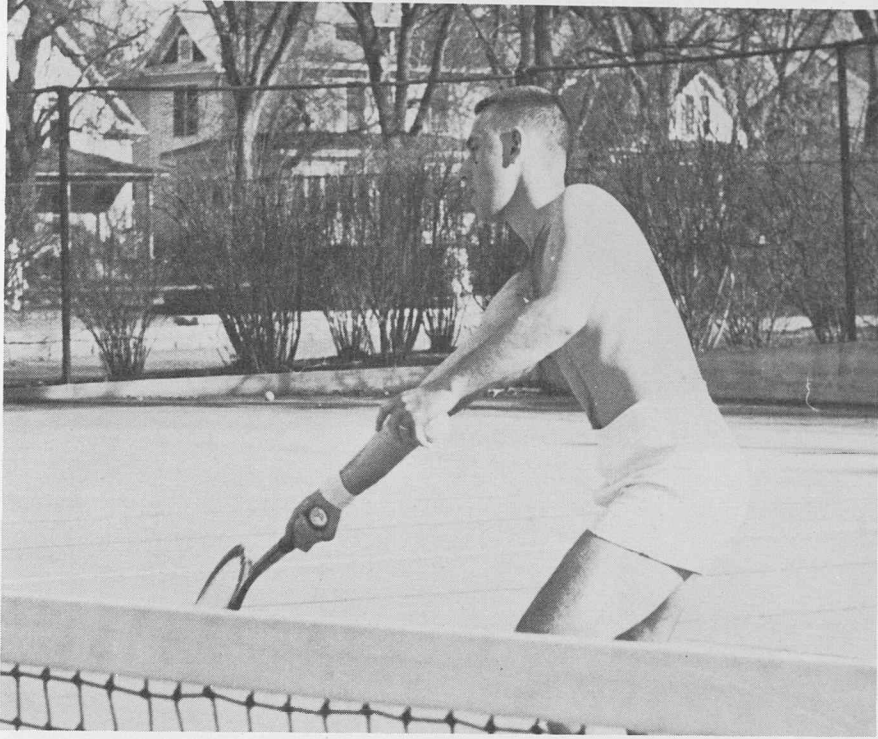

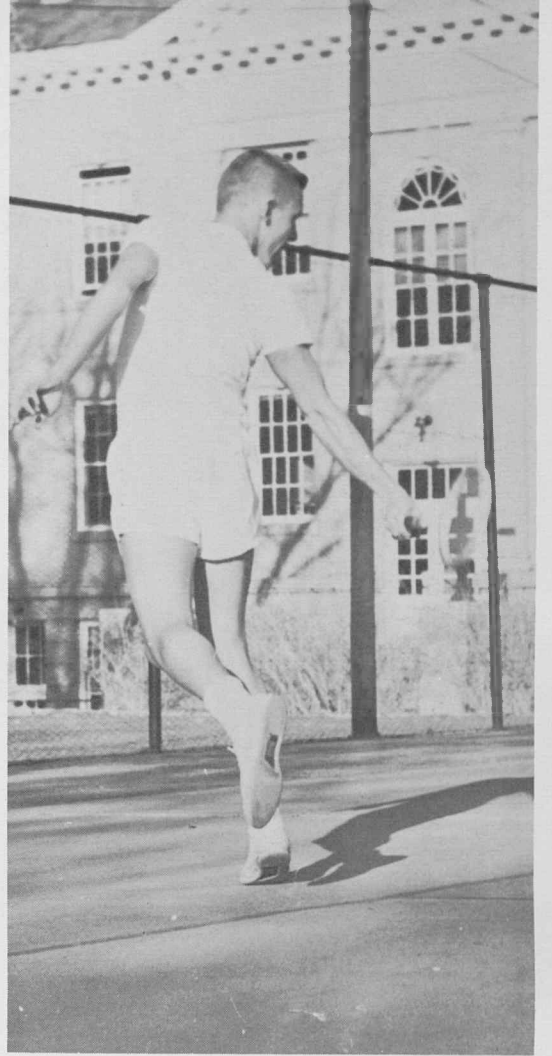

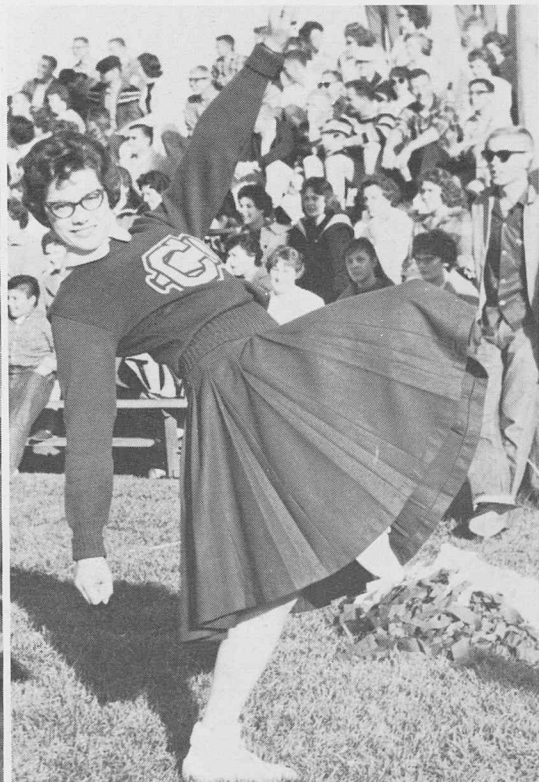
## GO BEARS GO!
