What's special about summer at the University of Northern Colorado?

- the spectacular surroundings from the Pawnee grasslands on the east to the Rocky Mountains on the west

What you may like best of all, however, is the flexible format from which you may choose your summer courses. Some courses are in the traditional eight- or ten-week quarter form, while many others are offered in short-term, concentrated units.

This summer UNC's four sessions include:

- 1 Pre-session. June 16-20. Ten-week courses begin this week.
- 2 Regular session. June 23-Aug. 15. Eight-week courses begin.
- 3 Post-session. Aug. 18-22.
- 4 Interim session. Aug. 25-Sept. 12.

A listing of *some* of the special courses and workshops that begin during each of these sessions begins on page 9. A complete listing by session begins on page 23.

The University

In 1970 UNC was granted university status in recognition of its extensive undergraduate and graduate programs. Founded as a normal school in 1889, it today enjoys accreditation by various agencies including the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.

The University's 243-acre campus includes the usual classroom, library, residence and athletic facilities as well as a laboratory school, educational resources and instructional materials centers, an FM radio station, bureaus of research and placement, and health and counseling services.

The Libraries

The University Libraries collection, comprised of more than 1.2 million units, is housed largely in the Michener Library. Holdings contain representative collections of literature in the fields of knowledge taught at the University as well as bound periodicals, government documents, pamphlets and reference materials, all in a variety of formats, e.g., print, microforms, motion pictures, filmstrips, slides, maps, phono records and tapes, braille writing, videotapes and cassettes.

A computerized retrieval service is available through the Reference Services. Interlibrary Loan Services can borrow library materials for students. This service is part of the Reference Department. Multimedia Services are composed of the Film Library Services; Photo-duplication Services; Microforms Reading and Storage; Educational Resources Center (containing educational materials, textbooks, curriculum guides and testing materials for the student who is preparing to teach) special Reserve Book Facility; and Reading Area and Services to the Handicapped.

There are separate libraries for music located on the Central campus and for children's and young adult literature in Bishop-Lehr Hall.

Educational Materials Services (EMS) maintains a permanent library of films, videotapes, filmstrips and other media materials, and is the central coordinating agency for all audio-visual equipment on the campus. A professional staff and facilities are available at EMS for the original production and/or duplication of audio-visual teaching materials including television programs, tape/slide programs, audio tape materials, and graphic art materials including overhead transparencies.

Greeley

A growing city and the seat of agricultural Weld County, Greeley is located 30 miles east of the Rocky Mountain foothills and 57 miles north of Denver. Founded in 1870 as an experimental community by Nathan Meeker, Horace Greeley's agricultural editor, the city today boasts many cultural and recreational opportunities. Besides the University and its

offerings these include a community college, a city-wide recreation program, twelve parks, three golf courses, two historical museums, a recreated village, two public libraries and the Greeley Philharmonic, the oldest symphony orchestra west of the Mississippi River.

For Your Children

Many educational opportunities are available for your children too. Morning classes are planned by the Laboratory School (kindergarten and grades one through six), and the Special Education School. Summer courses are planned for grades two through twelve by Greeley School District Six. More information on these programs may be obtained by calling the Laboratory School at 351-2116 or School District Six at 352-1543.

The University sponsors supervised recreational and cultural activities for the children of summer school students who elect to live in the dormitory. Your children ages 7 through 14, can benefit socially and culturally thorugh activities in this program under the supervision of Dr. Larry James, Director of Recreational Activities, 351-2067

Music and Theatre

This summer the College of Performing and Visual Arts will present a Festival of the Arts. Featured will be art exhibits, plays, opera, musical comedy, recitals, band and symphony concerts. Guest artists will join members of the faculty and UNC students in the presentation of a wide variety of artistic endeavors.

Performing groups will include the Summer Symphonic Band which gives concerts under the stars in the Garden Theatre, the Wind Ensemble and the Festival Orchestra which will perform a series of five Monday Evening Concerts featuring the music of Mozart. These groups are recruited from among the top collegiate players in the country. Scheduled for the Little Theatre of the Rockies will be four plays, an opera, and a musical, joint presentations with the School of Music. Professional artists will join University faculty and students to cast these works.

Those wishing more information about membership in the various summer performing organizations should contact The Little Theatre of the Rockies or The School of Music, University of Northern Colorado, Greeley, CO 80639. Scholarships and stipends are available to qualified individuals.

Undergraduate Programs

The Academic Program at UNC is organized into three colleges and seven schools;
College of Arts and Sciences
College of Education
College of Performing and Visual Arts
School of Business

School of Educational Change and Development School of Health, Physical Education and Recreation School of Industrial Technology and Home Economics School of Music School of Nursing School of Special Education and Rehabilitation

Programs are offered in Arts and Sciences, Teaching Professions and Applied and Professional Studies; four undergraduate degrees are available: B.A., bachelor of arts; B.S., bachelor of science; B.M., bachelor of music; and B.M.E., bachelor of music education.

Majors are offered in the teaching profession by numerous academic departments. Students studying for teacher certification must apply for admission to the Professional Teacher Education Program prior to their junior year. Courses applicable to pre-law, pre-medicine, pre-dentistry, and pre-engineering are available for students who want to begin their studies at UNC.

Because the University operates on a fourquarter basis, all programs of study are available to the summer student. The fourquarter plan can help a student complete his or her undergraduate requirements for graduation in three years, if he or she elects a program of continuous study. Please consult the *Undergraduate Bulletin* or your advisor for further program information.

Graduate Programs

The Graduate School offers advanced programs leading to the master of arts (M.A.), master of music (M.M.), master of music education (M.M.E.), master of science (M.S.), specialist in education (Ed.S.), doctor of arts (D.A.), doctor of education (Ed.D.), doctor of music education (D.M.E.), and doctor of philosophy (Ph.D.) degrees.

Detailed information concerning advanced degrees may be obtained by consulting the 1980-81 *Graduate Bulletin* or by writing to the Dean of the Graduate School, University of Northern Colorado, Greeley, Colorado 80639, (303) 351-2831.

Course Load and Credit

The normal load for graduate credit applicable to a degree is 15 hours per quarter. Overloads must be approved by the Dean of the Graduate School.

A student may take 16 hours of course work applicable to the degree program or certification during the regular eight-week session. If a student attends the pre-session plus the regular session, or the regular session plus the post-session he/she may count 19 hours in the degree program. If the student takes work in all three sessions, he/she may count 20 hours in the degree program or in certification. If a student wishes to register for an Individual Study or a course with the Departmental Prefix 622 for the pre-session he must register for that course on June 16.

Master's Degree

The master's degree may be earned in three summer quarters of full-time study. The master's degree is awarded upon completion of a minimum of 45 quarter hours of credit. Candidates must be on campus enrolled as full-time students for two quarters (at least ten weeks attendance and completion of ten quarter hours per quarter; eight weeks attendance and completion of ten quarter hours during the summer quarter) to satisfy the minimum residence requirements.

The master's degree is offered by the following departments or disciplines: Anthropology; Biological Science; Botany; Business; Chemistry; Communication; Curriculum and Instruction; Earth Science; Economics; Educational Administration; Educational Media; Elementary Education; English; Fine Arts; Foreign Languages; Geography: Gerontology; Health, Physical Education and Recreation; History; Home Economics; Industrial Arts; Mathematics; Music; Nursing; Physics; Political Science; Psychology, Counseling and Guidance; Reading; Statistics and Research Methods; Science Education; Social Science; Sociology; Special Education; Theatre Arts; and Zoology.* Master's degrees may also be earned through the School of Educational Change and Development (SECD).

Specialist in Education

This is a one-year program (minimum of 45 quarter hours) beyond the master's degree if the area of specialization is compatible with the undergraduate and master's major. A student may be admitted to an Ed.S. degree program with only a baccalaureate degree, but his program will require a minimum of 90 quarter hours.

The Ed.S. degree program is *not* necessarily a program of more courses in the same departmental patterns. It can be a multi- or cross-disciplinary program designed to serve the specific educational needs of a professional teacher. Each applicant for admission to the program will be considered on an individual basis in terms of the area in which he wishes to specialize. Although the University does not have the facilities, course offerings or staff to support all areas, it is prepared to provide study opportunities in virtually all facets of teaching.

In some disciplines, the Ed.S. course of study is partially or fully prescribed to satisfy certification requirements. Candidates who choose to continue work toward a doctoral degree on completion of the Ed.S. degree may apply for admission to the doctoral program. Specialist in Education degrees may also be earned through the SECD.

Doctor of Arts

A two-year program beyond the master's degree, the doctor of arts is designed to prepare a student for a lifetime of creative teaching at the junior (community) or senior college level with a supplementary commitment to research. The doctor of arts is offered in the following disciplines: Biological Sciences, Chemistry, Geography, History, Mathematics, or Music. A student

must earn a minimum of 72 quarter hours of credit and pass comprehensive examinations. In addition, he must write and defend an acceptable dissertation. The doctor of arts degree may also be earned through the SECD.

Doctor of Education

A two-year program beyond the master's degree, the doctor of education degree requires coursework along with research of a professional nature. The doctor of education is offered in following disciplines: Business Teaching; Curriculum and Instruction; Educational Administration: Elementary Education; Elementary Education: Early Childhood; English; English Education; Health and Physical Education; Industrial Arts; Mathematics Education; Music Education; Psychology, Counseling and Guidance; Reading; Rehabilitation Counseling; Science Education; and Special Education. A student must earn a minimum of 72 quarter hours of credit and pass comprehensive examinations. In addition he or she must write and defend an acceptable dissertation. The doctor of education degree may also be earned through the SECD.

Doctor of Philosophy

A two-year program beyond the master's degree or a three-year program beyond the baccalaureate degree, the doctor of philosophy requires coursework and research to prepare graduate students for teaching at the college level in either College Student Personnel Administration or Statistics and Research Methods.

Residence Requirements for all Doctoral Degrees

The University operates for four full quarters per year (fall, winter, spring and summer), and each candidate is required to spend three consecutive quarters in residence in full-time study (at least 10 weeks attendance and completion of ten quarter hours per quarter; eight weeks attendance and completion of ten quarter hours during the summer quarter). A student may use the following alternative method of satisfying the residence requirement if it is acceptable to his/her major department, upon request by the student to the chairperson. He/she may attend the University as a full-time student on campus in Greeley, Colorado, for a minimum of 48 weeks. During any quarter which the student uses to satisfy the 48-week requirement, he/she must complete a minimum of ten weeks attendance and ten

quarter hours (eight weeks attendance and ten quarter hours during summer quarter) of coursework applicable to the doctoral degree.

Study-Travel Courses

Caribbean Oceanography OCN 599-502, June 8-15 or Aug. 17-24, 3 credit hrs.

An oceanographic cruise and study tour of the British Virgin Islands and Caribbean coral reefs will be made twice during the summer of 1980, June 8-15 and August 17-24. The biological, geological, chemical, and physical aspects of the Caribbean Sea will be studied; field observations will be emphasized. SCUBA diving is optional, but students will be expected to help sail and navigate.

No prerequisites are required, but some background in geology and biology will be useful. Approximate cost is \$275 for the presession and \$250 for the post-session, plus air travel and tuition. Only a limited number of places are available: a \$100 deposit will secure you a bunk aboard the 44-foot yacht.

The Fashion/Textile Industry in England, Scotland and Scandinavia HEC 393/593-070, July 28-Aug. 15, 6 credit hrs

Take a three-week study abroad with a focus upon the design and manufacture of fabrics, apparel and accessories in Scotland and Scandinavia. Emphasis will be on the historical, cultural and educational aspects of European textiles and clothing. Enrollment minimum is 15 and maximum, 30. Estimated cost is \$1,600 to \$2,000. Study Tour of Colorado Business/Industries VTGEF 290-570 or 690-570, June 16-20, M-F, 4 undergraduate or graduate credit hrs.

This study tour will provide vocational teachers and counselors opportunity to observe Colorado business/industries in action. Emphasis will be upon 1) necessary entry level skills; 2) the opportunity for advancement based upon work experience and education; 3) trends in future employment; 4) the potential working relationship between school and business/industry; 5) business/industrial services provided to the community and the state. *The departments of Anthropology, Economics, Geography, Political Science, and Sociology offer a Master of Arts degree in Social Science. The student may concentrate on the discipline of his choice.

Enrollment Procedures

Admissions

Students applying for admission to the University of Northern Colorado for the summer quarter should complete and return the form on page 50. Additional information required as part of the application depends on your status as a student defined below. Undergraduates should contact the Director of Admissions for application forms. Inquiries concerning the graduate program or graduate admissions should be directed to the Dean of the Graduate School. The application for the baccalaureate and master's degrees and the graduate student certification program must be accompanied by a \$10 transcript evaluation fee.

Graduate Students


The University requires that the Graduate Record Examination Aptitude Test scores accompany the doctoral application. Your GRE Aptitude Test score is one criterion used in making admission decisions. Students seeking a graduate degree from the University of Northern Colado may transfer nine quarter hours toward a master's or specialist in education degree and 12 quarter hours toward a doctoral degree. If the work is acceptable to all members of the Oral Comprehensive Examination Committee,a doctoral student may transfer an additional 23 quarter hours.

Transfer Students

The University accepts a maximum of 135 quarter hours of transfer credits on undergraduate programs. Credits earned at a junior or community college after completion of the sophomore year, or those beyond 96 quarter hours are not transferable. All degree-seeking students must submit an official application for admission, a transcript of high school studies, two transcripts of previous college work and a health report. Application forms may be obtained by writing to the Director of Admissions.

Freshmen

If you are entering college for the first time you should write to the Director of Admissions for information and application forms. To be eligible to apply for admission, students must graduate in the upper one-half

of their class or have scores on the American College Test which are at or above national averages. Other minimal admission standards are defined in the *Undergraduate Bulletin*.

Special Students

An undergraduate student planning to attend the University of Northern Colorado for the summer quarter *only* must return the appropriate forms on page 50 and 51. Attendance for the summer quarter does not assure admission for subsequent quarters. Official application for admission must be made if the student plans to continue his degree program at the University of Northern Colorado.

Housing

All rates quoted are subject to the provision that the University reserves the right to change rates prior to the beginning of any academic quarter.

Single

University housing during the summer quarter for single men and women, registered for eight- or ten-week undergraduate or graduate programs, is provided on a room-and-board basis in Harrison Hall. Room and board cost is \$448 per person for the eight-week summer quarter.

Family

The University offers furnished, airconditioned apartments in Lawrenson Hall for married couples, (with a limit of two children) who are registered for eight- or ten-week academic programs. The cost is \$488 per family for the eight-week summer quarter.

Dining Hall meal service is available on an optional basis for families residing in Lawrenson Hall.

Workshop Housing

Housing is also provided in Turner Hall for students attending summer quarter workshops of four weeks or less in duration. These student facilities consist of two-bedroom air-conditioned apartments. Dining hall service is available on an optional basis

for short-term workshop students living in Turner Hall.

Application for Campus Housing.

If after applying, you desire to cancel your application for either single or family housing in the residence halls for summer quarter, you should notify the Director of Housing, in writing. The following policy will apply: If cancellation for summer quarter is received on or before May 30, 1980, \$25 will be refunded. There are no refunds for applications made and then cancelled after May 30, 1980.

Off-Campus

The Off-Campus Renters Information Service located in the University Center provides bulletin board assistance to students seeking off-campus housing in the Greeley area. Current listings of private rooms, apartments, houses and mobile homes are posted daily at their office. Prospective UNC students are welcome to write or call (303) 351-2172 for information.

Fees and Expenses

All rates quoted below are subject to a provision that the University reserves the right to change tuition, fees and other charges without notice. As with all state-supported institutions, the tuition rates are affected by legislative action which may not be completed until late spring of any given year.

(a) University, Student, and Health Services Fees are committed for the support of student activities programs, the Student Health Center, and the Student Representative Council. No part of these fees is remitted to those students who may not desire to make use of any or all of the privileges provided. Students will receive a Certificate of Registration upon completion of step 3 of the registration process, which will be required for University events.

(b) Health Insurance coverage is optional during the summer quarter only. If you were not enrolled in the student health insurance program spring quarter, 1980, you do not have health insurance coverage for the summer quarter, 1980. This insurance can be obtained only by requesting coverage at registration or at the Student Health Center during the first week of the quarter.

Your right as a student to classification as a resident for tuition payment purposes in a state institution of higher education is determined under State Law Title 23, Article 7, Colorado Revised Statutes 1973, as amended. Administrative procedures fix status before or at the time of registration. If, following a registration, the status conferred on a student is questioned for revision, appeal may be made during the first five days of classes on a specific form and the case will be reviewed by the University Committee on Residence Status. The determination by the committee following the review is final. All matters concerning residency status rulings shall be filed with the Office of the Registrar, where referrals will appropriately be made to the University Committee on Residence Status.

Policy on Reassessment, Refunds and Withdrawals

Adjustments in tuition or fees are permitted after registration only under specified conditions. A change in a course of study which results in a change of registered hours during the period ending with the last day for adding classes will result in a reassessment of tuition and fees. Tuition and fees will not be adjusted after the last day for adding classes.

To be eligible for a refund of any kind upon withdrawal from school you must present a formal, approved Notice of Withdrawal and Program Change Form(s) (Drop Slip) at the Cashier's Office. Refunds are not prorated; rather, they are made in terms of the policy statements below and the residence halls lease.

Refunds allowed against paid tuition and student services fees upon withdrawal are provided as follows:

• No refunds will be granted for special short-period classes (pre-session, postsession, interim session, or workshops) after the second meeting of the class.

• On programs of nine credit hours or less, the student will be assessed a \$15 withdrawal fee if withdrawal occurs during the first week of the term, \$30 if withdrawal occurs during the second week, \$45 if withdrawal occurs during the third week, and \$60 if withdrawal occurs during the fourth week. If the total tuition and fees are less than the withdrawal fee, the lesser amount will be charged. If you withdraw after the fourth week of the term, you will be required to pay the full amount of tuition and student services fees.

• On programs of ten or more credit hours, you will be assessed a \$25 withdrawal fee if

withdrawal occurs during the first week of the term, \$50 if withdrawal occurs during the second week, \$75 if withdrawal occurs during the third week, and \$100 if withdrawal occurs during the fourth week. If you withdraw after the fourth week of the term, you will be required to pay the full amount of tuition and student services fees.

 Refunds allowed against assessed quarterly board and room charges, apartment rentals, and the housing deposit are permitted under the terms of the housing lease. The Housing Office, when consulted at withdrawal, will provide information on the computations applied.

Incidental fees and health insurance are not refunded for any cause at anytime.

Payment of Student Account

Any student who enrolls in the University is responsible for the payment of tuition, fees, housing, food service, or any other charges and should be prepared to pay the full amount at the beginning of the term.

Your financial obligation to the University must be paid before registration is considered final (Step 4 of the registration process). This payment is to be completed at the Cashier's Office in Frasier Hall through one of the following methods or combination thereof: 1.) payment in full, 2.) payment through financial aid, 3.) payment through financial aid, 3.) payment through financial aid, 3.) percent of the total bill plus a deferral fee on the unpaid balance as shown on page 5, or 4.) payment by a sponsor (not financial aid).

Two additional statements of account will be mailed to your local address if any additional charges are incurred. You are required to notify the Registrar's Office promptly of any change in your local address or permanent mailing address.

Your past due financial obligation to the University is subject to a late payment fee as indicated in the list of fees shown on

The University will not register you, release a diploma, provide a transcript, nor provide placement services or other University services to any student or former student who has any financial obligation to it (other than a loan not yet due).

Any student who presents to the University a check that is not accepted for payment by the bank, because of insufficient funds, nonexistence of an account, or other reason for which you are responsible, is charged a fee of \$8. A notice of this fee and the amount of the "bad check" placed on your account is mailed to your local address or to your permanent mailing address. A "bad check" presented in payment of tuition, fees, and housing charges will be considered as a nonpayment and may result in withdrawal of your enrollment.

Registration Instructions

Registration consists of the following four steps:

- 1.) Distributing Course Selection Materials and Advising
- 2.) Selecting Courses
- 3.) Picking Up Schedule of Classes and Statement of Account
- 4.) Paying Student Account. Registration is complete only after all four steps are completed.

Step 1. Distributing Course Selection Materials and Advising

Course selection materials for summer quarter are available at the Registration Center, Room 247 of the University Center, beginning May 5 for students who wish to select classes in person. If you wish to select classes by mail use form 4 on page 50. On June 16 and June 23 course selection materials will be available in the lobby of the University Center.

Students may confer with advisors at designated times established by the advisor through appointments. The course selection card must be signed by you and your advisor (except forms for graduate majors in CSPA and EDSE, and undergraduate majors in ANT, BUS, ECON, EDEL, EDSE, GEOG, HEC, PSY, and SOC which do not require an advisor's signature) before proceeding to Step 2.

Step 2. Selecting Courses

In Person

Select courses at the Registration Center in Room 247 of the University Center anytime on or after May 5. The Registration Center is open to process course selections and schedule changes on all regular working days between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. All "holds" must be cleared by the appropriate department before you may select courses.

On Monday, June 23, students are admitted to the Registration Center at the time assigned below and follow the procedure for course selection outlined below.

Procedure for selecting courses:

a. Check course status board to determine whether or not the desired section is available. Every section that has closed or is canceled is so marked. (This course status board is constantly changing as students add or drop courses from their schedule; therefore, you should check the board before making any course selections.)

b. Enter the four-digit course identification number of each desired course on the course selection form. The course identification number is found at the left of each course entry in the *Summer Bulletin*. The desired number of credit hours is to be entered only if the course is offered for variable credit, or if you desire to enroll for no credit.

c.lf you wish to pay the \$2.00 CoPIRG fee, check the appropriate box on the course selection form. (See explanation of CoPIRG fee below.)

d. Present the course selection form to a terminal operator at the Registration Center.

e. You will receive a Registration confirmation showing what you have just selected as you leave the Registration Center. This should be checked for accuracy.

By Mail

If selecting courses by mail use form 4 on page 50. (If you have never enrolled at UNC or have not been enrolled since Fall 1959 you must also complete form 3 page 51 and return it to the Admissions Office or Graduate School along with form 4.) Course selection forms received after May 30 will not be processed and will be returned to sender.

a. Enter the four-digit course identification number of each desired course on the course selection form. The course identification number is found at the left of each course entry in the *Summer Bulletin*. The desired number of credit hours is to be entered only if the course is offered for variable credit, or if you desire to enroll for no credit.

b. If you wish to pay the \$2.00 CoPIRG fee, check the appropriate box on the course selection form. (See explanation of CoPIRG fee below.)

c. You will receive by mail after June 2 a printed copy of your registration schedule showing what you have selected as well as a statement of account including tuition, fees and miscellaneous charges (Step 3). Payment

must be made by June 30, or registration will not be considered final, and class space will be released to other students (Step 4).

Making Schedule Changes and Corrections

Corrections and changes to your schedule of classes are made by using the schedule change form on the reverse side of the registration confirmation form. These changes can be made any time (except June 23), after you first select courses for summer quarter until June 30.

Procedure for making schedule changes:

- a. Check the course status board to determine whether or not the desired section is available.
- b. Enter the four-digit course identification number of each desired course on the add portion of the schedule change form. The desired number of credit hours is to be entered only if the course is offered for variable credit, or if you desire to enroll for no credit.

Enter the four-digit course identification number of each course you wish to drop from your schedule on the *drop* portion of the schedule change form.

- c. Present schedule change form to a terminal operator at the Registration Center.
- d. Before leaving the Registration Center, you will receive a registration confirmation form for the quarter in which you are making the transaction.

Special Notes

Course Restrictions. There are several courses listed in the Summer Bulletin that are restricted to certain classes of persons. The appropriate restriction is indicated under the column prerequisites and notes. When such a restriction is noted, you must present to the terminal operator a special permit to enroll card which is signed by the appropriate faculty member.

Nonscheduled Courses. Students are permitted to enroll in nonscheduled courses with the permission of a supervising faculty member. Nonscheduled course enrollments are processed at the same time as other course selections at the Registration Center. Use 8000 as the course identification number and indicate the number of hours for which you wish to enroll on the course selection form or schedule change form. Present the completed nonscheduled course form to the terminal operator at the time of the transaction.

CoPIRG Fee. CoPIRG is the Colorado Public Interest Research Group, an action and research oriented organization established by the university students of Colorado. Student contributions of \$2.00 and student energy have enabled CoPIRG to provide free money-saving consumer help and to work toward the protection and betterment of our environment.

Special Undergraduate Registration Instructions

1. Undergraduate students may not enroll in 500-700 level courses, *except* that qualified juniors and seniors may enroll in 500-level

courses if they present a properly signed permit to enroll form.

- 2. The normal undergraduate course load for a quarter is 18 hours of credit. Beginning June 23 and ending June 30, you may get permission to enroll for more hours if necessary. Undergraduate overloads must be approved by the Dean of Students or assignee who signs the permit to enroll card. This card is presented to the terminal operator at the Registration Center when selecting classes that involve an overload. Additional tuition is charged for every credit hour over 18.
- 3. Student Teachers. All full or part-time student teachers not taking any other courses complete their registration materials and turn them in to the EDFE Office and do NOT go to the Registration Center. Student teachers taking other courses while student teaching complete Step 2 for the other courses only. EDFE 444, Supervised Teaching (student teaching), registration is done in the EDFE office ONLY.

Special Graduate School Registration Instructions

1. All unclassified graduate students (not officially admitted to a graduate degree program) must report to the Graduate School Office, Frasier Hall, Room 108, for advising before proceeding to Step 2. The course selection card must be completed and signed by Dr. George Leach. Please note that anyone who has not received an official admission notice from the Graduate School Office is not in a degree program.

2. Graduate overloads (more than 15 quarter hours) must be approved by the graduate dean or assignee who signs the permit to enroll card. This card is presented to the terminal operator at the Registration Center when selecting classes that involve an overload. Additional tuition is charged for every credit hour over 18.

Step 3. Picking up Schedule of Classes and Statement of Account

Students who complete Step 2 prior to 4 p.m., May 30, will receive their schedule of classes and statement of account by mail after June 2. Payment must be made by 3:30 p.m., June 30, or the registration will not be considered final and class spaces will be released to other students.

Students who complete Step 2 between June 2 and June 23 must pick up their schedule of classes and statement of account in the University Center, West Ballroom, on June 24 or 25, between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. Between June 26 and June 30 these forms are available at the Records Office, Frasier Hall.

Step 4. Paying Student Account

Any student who enrolls in the University is responsible for the payment of tuition, fees,

housing, food service, or any other charges and should be prepared to pay the full amount at the beginning of the term.

Your financial obligation to the University must be paid prior to 3:30 p.m., June 30, before registration is considered final. This payment is to be completed at the Cashier's Office in Frasier Hall through one of the following methods: 1.) payment in full, 2.) payment through financial aid, 3.) payment through the deferral plan of at least 50 percent of the total bill plus a deferral fee on the unpaid balance as shown in the *Graduate* or *Undergraduate Bulletin*, or 4.) payment by a sponsor (not financial aid).

Withdrawing from Class

You are not permitted to withdraw from a class in which you are enrolled after the midpoint of the course. The last day to withdraw from an eight- or ten-week course summer quarter is July 18. To withdraw from a course, use the schedule change form on the reverse side of the registration confirmation form.

Procedure for withdrawing from a class:

- a. Obtain faculty signatures for every section from which you wish to withdraw.
- b. Enter the course prefix number and section as well as the course identification number of each course from which you wish to withdraw on the withdrawal portion of the schedule change form.
- c. Present the schedule change form to a terminal operator at the Registration Center.
- d. Before leaving the Registration Center you will receive a copy of the registration confirmation for the quarter in which you are making the transaction.

Faculty Drop for Failure to Attend the First Two Class Periods

You are reminded that a faculty member can, at his discretion, drop a student who does not attend the first two class meetings in order to make room for other students who wish to enroll. If for some reason you cannot attend the first two meetings, it is advisable to contact the instructor to guarantee registration. Not all instructors will exercise this option; therefore, do not rely on the assumption that nonattendance will automatically withdraw you from class.

Special Late Registration Instructions (June 24-27)

Step 1. Obtain course selection materials at the Registration Center. Confer with an academic advisor before proceeding to step 2.

Step 2. Select courses according to the procedure outlined in Step 2, Selecting Courses, as printed above.

Steps 3 and 4. Your financial obligation to the University must be paid prior to 3:30 p.m., June 30, before registration is considered final. Students who fail to meet their financial obligation by this date will not be on class rolls or receive credit.

Special Workshop Registration Instructions

1. If you are enrolling in workshops only, register for those courses in the assigned classroom during the first class meeting.

2. If you enroll in a workshop beginning prior to June 27, you must meet your financial obligation to the University prior to 3:30 p.m., June 30, or your registration is not considered final. Students who fail to meet their financial obligation by this date will not be on class rolls or receive credit.

To Completely Withdraw

If you wish to completely withdraw from school during the quarter you must initiate the withdrawal process in the Dean of Students Office, Frasier Hall, or in the Student Services Center, University Center. Students who make a complete withdrawal from the University will be charged a withdrawal fee. Please refer to the refund policy, page 5.

To Obtain Transcripts

Transcripts for summer quarter will be available upon request two weeks after the close of the quarter. Transcripts for the summer interim session will be available upon request two weeks after the close of the interim session.

To Be Graduated

Graduation is scheduled at 9 a.m., Saturday, August 16, in the Garden Theatre. You are encouraged to attend. Those who choose not to participate must notify the Office of the Registrar (Graduate School for graduate students) at least two weeks (August 1) prior to graduation so that appropriate addresses can be confirmed and graduation details can be clarified with colleges, schools and departments. Students who participate in graduation are required to wear appropriate academic costume. Caps and gowns may be rented from the University Bookstore. No applications for graduation will be accepted after July 3, 1980.

To Register for the Summer Interim Session

Registration for summer interim session courses will be conducted at the Registration Center, Room 247, University Center. Withdrawals from these courses must be made before 3 p.m. of the mid-point day (count class days only) of the course.

Final Exams

On April 27, 1972, the faculty adopted a calendar that eliminated the three-day final examination schedule. Final examinations will not be scheduled specifically but are to be given at the discretion of the faculty member in accordance with the policy established by his/her school/college. However, classes are expected to meet on all scheduled periods including the last day a class is scheduled in the quarter.

*Drop/Add Deadline. Students are permitted to make individual drop/add changes in their program through the end of the drop/add period. Courses that are dropped during this time will not appear on a student's record nor will the student be assessed the corresponding tuition charges.

†Withdrawal Deadline. Students are permitted to withdraw from a course until the mid-point of the course. A withdrawal will appear on the student's record as a W which will not affect the grade point average. Tuition will be charged for these courses.

NOTICE. The Registrar's Office hereby gives notice that it has designated the following information as "directory information" under 348 (a) (5) (B) of the Family Education Rights and Privacy Act of 1974. Directory information concerning students at the University will be released during the current school year without the prior consent of the student as permitted by law unless within ten (10) days after registration a student has notified the Registrar's Office, located in Frasier Hall, Room 123, that such information should not be released without his or her

consent. This notification must be made each year during which the student is registered. Workshop in Teaching English: Written Composition Correlated with Literature Study

EED 403-037, July 21-Aug. 1, MTWF, 1:40-4:05, 2 credit hrs.

Written composition and literature study, two major areas of the secondary English curriculum, enhance each other. The individual will expand his familiarity with literature for his level of interest, then collect

Hispanic Civilization and Culture SPAN 508-407, June 30-July 11, M-F, 1:40-4:05, 2 credit hrs.

Brief overview of the contemporary cultures and civilizations of the Hispanic World, followed by a more in-depth study of modern Mexico. Topics such as religion, family, and government will be studied through readings

from current periodicals as well as from texts that discuss current trends in Mexican culture and society. Lynn A. Sandstedt. 351-2811.

Skill Building in Spanish

SPAN 508-410, June 30-July 25, TTh, 4:25-5:25, 1 credit hr.

An intensive, practical review of composition techniques during the first 2 weeks, followed by an opportunity to develop conversational skills. Topics for composition or discussion may be chosen from material covered in the Hispanic literature and civilization courses offered in conjunction with this course. Hispanic Literature for the Classroom SPAN 508-427, July 14-25, M-F, 1:40-4:05, 2 credit hrs.

History




