CJ ARCHIBEQUE '93, '02



CJ Archibeque was a community servant and youth advocate in Greeley, serving the Jesus Rodarte Community Center for more than 20 years. Throughout northern Colorado, Archibeque was recognized as a staunch advocate for local young people, especially those who were at risk and may not have a strong support system. Archibeque was known for his creativity in identifying new ways to help youth find success, as well as his determination in making

sure good ideas came to fruition. Archibeque served on several boards and committees in the community, helping him build a network of allies that would serve at risk youth.

Archibeque earned his master's degree in Emotional and Behavioral Disorders from the University of Northern Colorado, not because he wanted to teach, but because he wanted to better support the youth he encountered on a daily basis. Through his leadership, the center became a welcoming home to young people who needed a safe place to spend their time, be heard and feel understood.

Archibeque had previously earned his bachelor's degree in Criminal Justice and recognized how his education helped him support students as they navigated encounters with law enforcement. By studying special education and connecting what he learned with his work, he was better able to offer an education-oriented support system for them.

After graduation, Archibeque stayed connected to the Special Education program through research-oriented collaboration with faculty and students, internship opportunities, program implementation partnerships, and class presentations.

Archibeque's pride in his alma mater combined with his desire to see students succeed led him to recruit several students to attend UNC. While he never thought of himself as a teacher, and even intentionally did not have a teaching certification, he was able to identify potential and promote students in a way that led many down the path to higher education.



PATRICIA ESCOBAR (TRISH) '07. '11



Patricia Escobar has become the face of the César Chávez Cultural Center at the University of Northern Colorado, making the center a welcoming home for Latinx identifying students on campus. Escobar started at the university as a temporary, part-time administrative assistant in the center. Through her interactions with students and after seeing their experience, she decided to go back to school as a non-traditional student. Eventually Escobar earned

her bachelor's degree in Spanish and her master's degree in foreign languages with a Spanish teaching emphasis while becoming the Director of the Chávez Center.

Throughout her 26 year-career, Escobar has made students her priority. The Chávez Center has become a place where students can explore their cultural identity and open their minds to different perspectives while receiving the support they need to succeed at a university.

Students often refer to the center as their home, and alumni regularly return to introduce their spouses to Escobar or tell her about their children and careers. Escobar also pulls from her extensive network of colleagues and alumni to support current students and help them build their own networks as they navigate college and life after graduation. She inspires students to believe in themselves and empowers them to have agency over their lives.

Escobar has received many awards for her work. Most of the recognition she has received from local organizations, student groups, and the university is not displayed in her office because the plaques are "too showy." Instead, she hangs her students' graduation announcements on the walls around her desk, surrounding herself with the community she has built.

Today Escobar is an adjunct professor in the Hispanic Studies department and partners with UNC's Cumbres Teacher Preparation Program, the other cultural centers, and other programs at UNC. Her resiliency and dedication to the success of students are inspiring to her colleagues, and her compassion and optimism have impacted thousands of students during her time at UNC.



JUDGE PAULA F. SHERLOCK '71

As a first-generation college student at the University of Northern Colorado, **Judge Paula F. Sherlock** balanced long work hours, heavy course loads, motherhood, and cheering for her husband at UNC wrestling matches. Her UNC experience was the first step toward a career that would transform family courts in her community.

Sherlock retired as the Chief Judge of Jefferson County Family Court in Louisville, Kentucky. Over the course of her career, Sherlock continued balancing personal and professional commitments. Because of her passion for advocacy, she developed programs for the court, won numerous awards, and made a clear impact.

Known as an advocate for children and families, Sherlock has volunteered with local and national nonprofits that provide foster care for incarcerated parents, substance abuse treatment and emergency shelters, residential and support services for disabled adults, safe housing and educational opportunities for single mothers and their children, and clothing and mentorship for women moving from welfare to the workplace.

In her official capacity, Sherlock has coordinated cooperative programs between the court and children's treatment centers. She also chaired judicial efforts to develop a family treatment court to care for children and families affected by opioid addiction. Sherlock led efforts to establish the Judicial Center as a "No Hit Zone," part of a national push for nonviolent conflict resolution, and is now consulting for three courthouses in other states as they adopt the philosophy.

Sherlock's work has earned her several awards, including Judge of the Year three times. She earned the award in 2016 from the Women Lawyers Association, in 2015 from the Louisville Bar Association and in 2014 from the Kentucky Chapter of the American Academy of Matrimonial Attorneys.

Sherlock has generously provided a wide range of support for UNC for many years and strives to connect her network to her alma mater. She and her husband have a strong relationship with the wrestling team, and she was the keynote speaker at the fall Undergraduate Commencement in 2017.



TONY TOLBERT '97, '08



Tony Tolbert decided to become a teacher because he hated his K-12 educational experience. He wanted to make sure other students would not feel the same way, so he came to the University of Northern Colorado to develop the skills that would ignite the desire to learn in others. Tolbert has taken his knowledge of the systemic challenges that students face and ensured each student he encounters has the support he or she needs to succeed.

Tolbert's passion for his students goes beyond the classroom. He spends his time mentoring students who may feel marginalized, establishing student groups and creating programming for them, and serving his community. Tolbert was an essential component in starting a Black Student Alliance Group at Monarch High School. He also helped launch a Hip Hop Club on two high school campuses that earned a bid to the national level competition.

Inside the classroom, Tolbert has been a leader in infusing technology into his students' learning experience, specifically focusing on 3-D technology and building a Bring Your Own Device program at his school and throughout the district. His push for technology integration earned him a position as lead teacher in a Texas Instruments case study, and a key role in developing guidelines endorsed by the American Optometry Association.

Tolbert volunteers at UNC admissions events by talking to families and leading workshops. He gave the keynote address to admitted students at a Black Excellence Week event where attendees said they were excited to enroll at UNC after his remarks highlighted his own student experience through memories. Tolbert also promotes UNC to his students, pointing out that all their favorite teachers graduated from the same university.

Tolbert has coached cheerleading, dance, track and field, wrestling and student council while promoting inclusion, diversity, community and school spirit. Thousands of students have been influenced by Tolbert's teaching. Providing insight and opportunities to students and sharing the impact UNC had on his own development has made a difference for the community he serves.



MONIKA VISCHER '89



When Monika Vischer started on the path toward her radio career, she was a student at the University of Northern Colorado. After graduation, she would go on to an illustrious career with Colorado Public Radio and become a leader in providing opportunities for underserved children in the state. Vischer currently serves as the program director for CPR Classical.

As a student, Vischer studied Journalism and Mass Communication, but held on tightly to her lifelong love of music. She played flute in the wind ensemble and performed with the vocal jazz sextet The Axidentals. Through her participation in these cocurricular groups, she had the opportunity to perform and adjudicate at festivals and clinics in the United States and Canada, bringing attention to the university's music programs.

Vischer worked as a host and reporter as a staff announcer at KUNC-FM during her five years on campus. This position helped launch a career that would earn her numerous national awards for arts journalism, including the New York Festivals Radio Awards Silver World Medal for the daylong radio special "Sound of America," and the National Clarion Award for the five-part radio documentary "A Voice for the Silenced," a copy of which resides at the US Holocaust Museum in Washington D.C.

In 2011, Vischer co-founded El Sistema Colorado, a program that provides opportunities to high risk youth through ensemble music. It started with a few third graders and kindergartners playing cardboard violins. Through Vischer's volunteer advocacy, it has grown so that it now serves three schools and nearly 200 students, with more than 1000 musicians participating since the organization was brought to Denver. She has fostered partnerships that have brought current El Sistema Colorado students on the stage at the Aspen Music Festival and at Red Rocks with the Colorado Symphony Orchestra.

Vischer's commitment to serving youth and connecting them to the arts, while growing her own passions in media and music, showcase the difference one alumna can make in her community.



DAVID L. WOOD & CAROL B. WOOD, HONORARY



David L. Wood and Carol B. Wood are the guiding force behind the Griffin Foundation, and they have been members of the University of Northern Colorado community for several decades. Holding to the foundation's pillars of health care, performing arts, and education, the Woods established a close partnership with UNC due to the university's programmatic strengths.

One of the foundation's mainstays has been its scholarship program, which supports community college graduates who continue their postsecondary education at local universities. The last class of Griffin Scholars will graduate in 2019, at which point the foundation will have given more than \$3 million in scholarships, including 36 awards to Bears. The couple often goes beyond providing financial assistance for these students to ensure they have the support structure and guidance necessary to graduate.

The generosity the Woods have provided directly to UNC has made a lasting impact on the university, most visibly when the Griffin Foundation became one of the first donors to UNC's Campus Commons. Because of their connection to the university, the Woods were among the first to see the plans for the Campus Commons, a building that will feature a new performance hall and rehearsal space for the university's performing arts. The performance hall balcony will be named for the Griffin Foundation in honor of their gift that remains one of the largest to the project.

Pat Griffin intended for his estate to serve one generation, and the Woods have carefully guided the Griffin Foundation to fulfill this legacy. After 25 years supporting northern Colorado, the Woods have begun to wind down the foundation's assets with the intention of closing it in 2019.

As firm and ardent supporters of UNC, the Woods have always believed in UNC's potential, and they have become deeply ingrained in the life of the university. They have been faithful stewards of Pat Griffin's legacy, and through their work they have become cherished members of the UNC community.
